

Tribute to Rose (Segedi) Kaufman By daughter, Lois Cornell

(It was with great pleasure that the family of Rose Kaufman presented a check to the ATS to establish a perpetual scholarship award in memory of their parents, Dale and Rose Kaufman. Following are some highlights of their lives.)

Rose (Segedi) Kaufman, formerly of Ellwood City, Pennsylvania, was active in the Transylvanian Saxons Junior Association athletics during the late 1930's. Among her medals found are two for high jump, one for shot put, two for broad jump and one for girls relay. All have the TSJA initials engraved on them-some in gold, some in silver and one in bronze. Two are marked 1935 and four in 1937. Her ages then were 16 and 18, respectively. She also played basketball on a traveling team and enjoyed the games and the group singing that usually followed the games in the various Saxon Club bar rooms.

Once she met Dale Kaufman who eventually became her husband, she let her hair grow and started to dress and act as a lady! They married in 1941 in Ellwood City, PA at the home of her German Lutheran minister, Rev. Beisecker.

After they raised three children she went to college with a goal of finishing in four years and before she turned fifty. She graduated from Slippery Rock University with high honors just weeks before her fiftieth birthday with majors in German and Library Science. She accomplished this while working at their Kaufman Dairy Store in Ellwood City.

Rose and Dale were very civic minded and very supportive of each other's endeavors. While she studied, he learned to love and play golf! He served on the city council and led the local Kiwanis Club. Rose served as a translator of German documents for a historical society and also was a member of the Ellwood City Board of Education.

During the summer school vacation months of her twelve year teaching career, she led her students of German on tours of Germany, studied for her Master's Degree in German Literature in Munich, visited relatives in Pullach, Germany and those behind the Iron Curtain. And Dale golfed!

After retiring to Florida they participated in vocal groups, volunteered at the local library and visited relatives far and

Dale died in 2003 at eightyfour. Rose passed in 2014, just a few weeks after her ninety-fifth birthday. She was so proud of her Saxon heritage and all it meant throughout her life. She was known to say in recent years, "I've had a wonderful life and I'm ready to go." She died unexpectedly, in bed, just as she hoped she would.

Low dose aspirin some cancer, study

studies were compiled in a review published by the Annals of Oncology. The results make a case for aspirin as a preventive.

Reported by UC Berkeley, the main finding: Taking aspirin daily for 10 years after age 50 may cut the risk of colorectal, stomach and esophageal cancer by about one-third. It may reduce heart attacks by 18 percent and death rates even more. Smaller benefits were found for prostate, breast and lung cancer.

Risks decreased when people took aspirin daily for three years between ages 50 and 65. The benefits increased with 10 years of aspirin and seemed to carry over for five additional years.

The research suggests that low-dose aspirin is as effective as higher doses. But at age 70 and beyond, they say it's wise to stop due to bleeding risks.

Though relatively rare, the most serious consequence of taking aspirin was a higher risk of hemorrhagic stroke, caused by bleeding

The light-weight, collapsible scooter (like the Razor and others) appear to be largely responsible for a 40 percent increase in children's injuries between 1990 and 2011. Injuries from other types of toys continued at a steady pace.

Boys and young children were most at risk, and falls were the most common mishap. They sent 195,363 children to emergency rooms in 2011, up from 121,249 toy injuries in 1990, say researchers at the Center for Injury Research and Policy in Columbus, Ohio.

The study on children younger than age 18 is the first nationally representative long-term look at toyrelated injuries says the Consumer Product Safety Commission.




