Time to review withholding and savings strategies?

Seven big tax changes for 2015

Though 2014 taxes don't need to be filed until April, some late starters won't make it. For 2014, the penalty for late payment is 1 percent of your household income or \$95 per person.

Changes for 2015

- 1. The Health Insurance Penalty. All Americans must have health insurance or pay a penalty. For 2015, those penalties will be 2 percent of household income or \$325 per person, which can really add up.
- 2. About 401(k) limits. Employee contributions to a 401(k) plan will increase to \$18,000, up \$500 from 2014. Tell your payroll department now to adjust your contributions.
- 3. Flexible Spending Accounts. The 2015 limit on employee contributions is \$2,550 for qualified health care expenses. That's up \$50 from 2014.
- 4. The Standard Deduction. The basic tax break for all Americans each year rises to \$6,300 for single filers and \$12,600 for married taxpayers filing jointly for 2015. That's up \$100 and \$200 respectively. It's important because if you can't itemize enough deductions to pass this amount, this is the only tax break you're likely to get on your 2015 tax return.
- 5. New Tax Brackets. Tax thresholds have been adjusted for inflation. The highest rate of 39.6 percent will now apply to single taxpayers who make \$413,200 and married couples making at least \$464,850. The figures are up 1.6 percent from 2014. For more information, check the IRS website.
- 6. IRA Rollovers. In 2015, you can only make one rollover from an IRA in a 12-month period. But you can still make as many "trustee-to-trustee" transfers as you wish, moving your money from one provider to another. Limit all rollovers to direct transfers in 2015 if you plan on moving money more than once.
- 7. AMT changes. The "alternative minimum tax" sets a limit on tax breaks and ensures a minimum tax burden on the middle class.

The Alternative Minimum Tax exemption for 2015 is \$53,600 for individuals and \$83,400 for joint filers, or up about 1.5 percent from 2014.



What would Lincoln do?

Abraham Lincoln had less leadership experience than previous presidents. George Washington and Andrew Jackson were generals, some had been governors, and the Southerners owned plantations. Yet Lincoln filled the office of president so effectively that he regularly tops historians' ranking of great presidents.

Which of his principles of action can guide has successors?

Cite precedent. Ever the lawyer, he found precedents and men he could look up to in America's founding fathers. His career was a long effort to show that his positions were those of the founding fathers, especially when it came to slavery, human nature, liberty and equality.

Make your case. Lincoln could play inside baseball, says biographer Richard Brookhiser. He could make deals and manipulate colleagues when he had to. He recognized that democracies are not ruled by such maneuvers but by the people. Lincoln once said, "Public opinion in this country is everything." It depends on wooing, shaping and educating public opinion.

Use Humor. He often used jokes to distract people he knew he couldn't satisfy immediately. His humor worked on a deeper level to keep things in proportion, reminding people that they shouldn't be surprised at the unexpected, but carry on, jauntily if possible.

Put principles first. His position against slavery was well established. In 1860, he ended the Cooper Union Address with this appeal to fellow Republicans: "Let us have faith that right makes might, and in the faith, let us, to the end, dare to do our duty as we understand it."

Be inclusive. The Republican party, formed in 1854-56, included longtime abolitionists, Whigs, Democrats, and Know Nothings, who disliked both slavery and immigrants. Some called his cabinet the "Team of Rivals."

In his 1854 Peoria speech, Lincoln said, "Stand with anybody that stands with RIGHT. Stand with him while he's RIGHT and part with him when he goes wrong."

It worked for Lincoln and might work for you.

People over age 55 are fraudsters' favorite targets

No question about it. Some age 55-plus Americans have the most financial savvy of any group. But some that age and older are targeted for various types of fraud.

They have income and savings, are open to "good deals" offered by scammers, and, surprisingly, if they turn out to be victims, 75 percent of them are too embarrassed to report being robbed.

Frauds are easier to report since the Senate Special Committee on Aging launched a Fraud Hotline to help deal with the "epidemic" of frauds and scams recently targeting older Americans.

You can call the hotline at 855-303-9470 or visit the website at aging.senate.gov.

Frauds include lottery scams where "winners" pay large upfront fees to collect; computer scams where people are tricked into believing they have malware and charged a lot to "fix" the problem; taxrefund schemes which may include identity theft.

In the grandparent phone scam, the caller says he's a grandchild in need of big money for a legal or health problem.

Then there are Social Security scams, and Medicare fraud where victims are convinced they owe money for care or procedures they never had.

The Senate committee often deals with two issues: the frequency with which victims don't report fraud, and the difficulty victims have when trying to report the scam.

Hotline personnel provide consumers with advice on the steps that can be taken, including where to report the fraud locally, and ways to reduce the likelihood of becoming a victim a second time.

Some make-ahead ideas for Easter

Many are the techniques used by the Easter bunnies of the world to make sure all the plastic eggs are found during the Easter Egg Hunt.

If you have tried counting eggs before and after or working with colors, you know that these techniques



sometimes work. And sometimes don't. Here is one idea, from the boards of Pinterest.com, that could make unfound eggs a thing of the past.

If older kids are hunting, try putting a puzzle piece in each egg. After the hunt, the hunters put the puzzle together. If there is a piece missing, then not all of the eggs have been found.

You can use the same puzzle year after year for the hunt.

For ages 6 and up, you can also try using letters and numbers in the eggs. Kids can try to find all the letters needed to make their names, for example.

For teens, dimes or quarters in each egg makes the hunt very thorough. Add up the booty at the end of the hunt to know if all the eggs were found and who found the most.

Vinyl records come back Sales of LPs surged 49 percent in 2014

Nearly eight million oldfashioned vinyl LPs were sold in 2014. Younger people, especially indie-rock fans, are buying the records. They are attracted by the perceived superior sound quality of vinyl and the ritual of putting needle to groove, says advisor Neil Shah

While new LPs continue to hit the stores, the machines that press records haven't been manufactured for decades. Just one company supplies all the estimated 90 percent of raw material that the industry

According to The Wall Street Journal, under these conditions, the 15 or so still-running factories that make the records face daily challenges with breakdowns and supply shortages.

Many producers, including United Record Pressing in Nashville, Tenn., are adding presses, but overall, entrepreneurs don't want to invest capital in an industry that represents just 2 percent of U.S. music sales.

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

The first prizes of an open Cuba: cigars and rum?

If President Obama and counterpart Raul Castro can put an overdue end to an era of Cuban-American relations, it still remains unclear what the future of trade will look like.

Just negotiating the deal was difficult enough, requiring a year of secret talks between the two countries and with an assist by Pope Francis. The U.S. and Cuba also made a swap of spies.

President Obama's announcement means an incremental change for American lovers of Cuban cigars and rum. For those who fall among





the categories of legal travel to Cuba, the administration is allowing \$100 worth of cigars or alcohol per person. The impact will be negligible for the U.S. cigar industry unless Congress lifts the trade embargo.

With rum, Bacardi & Co. was founded in Cuba but left after its operations were nationalized. It later feuded with Cuba and French maker Pernod Ricard SA over rights to the Havana Club brand.

They say the decision to allow Americans to import \$100 of alcohol will allow people to bring home "a bottle of the true genuine Cuban rum Havana Club."

Chairman Facundo Bacardi says the company intends to return if there is an improvement in Cuban human rights.

US-amerikanische Musiker gründen Erich Bergel Stiftung

Aus Rumänien vor Jahrzehnten in die USA immigrierte und dort sesshafte Musiker und Musikpädagogen gründeten gemeinsam mit amerikanischen Musikerpersönlichkeiten in North Carolina eine Stiftung zum Zweck der Pflege des Gedenkens an den Dirigenten und Musikwissenschaftler Prof. Dr. h.c. mult. Erich Bergel (1930-1989). Ehemals in den USA um vieles bekannter als in Deutschland, war der in Rosenau, Kreis Kronstadt, geborene Erich Bergel jahrelang Chefdirigent des Houston-Symphony-Orchesters und dirigierte mehrfach auch alle anderen großen Klangkörper der USA.

Unter dem Vorsitz der durch musikpädagogische Verdienste an der 1838 gegründeten Duke-University über North Carolina hinaus bekannten Dorothy Kitchen formulierte ein zu Beginn dieses Jahres konstituierter Ausschuss die Satzung der "Erich Bergel & Dorothy Kitchen Foundation 2015" mit der Zielvorgabe, jährlich einen internationalen Violin-Wettbewerb dieses Namens für junge Geiger zu veranstalten. Als Ort der Austragung wählten die Amerikaner Heltau in Siebenbürgen. Die Wahl fiel auf diese Stadt, weil der Vater des Dirigenten, Erich Bergel sen., lange Jahre als Studiendirektor und Musikerzieher am dortigen deutschsprachigen Gymnasium das Musikleben Heltaus über die Schule hinaus anregte und bestimmte. Seine Schüler sind heute als Musiker in mehreren Ländern anzutreffen. Einer von ihnen, der seit Jahrzehnten in Hills Borough in North Carolina lebende Mitch Scurtu – Bewunderer auch Erich Bergels jun. und Besucher seiner Konzerte in den USA-, hatte den Anstoß zur Stiftungsgründung gegeben, die Verbindung zu den Heltauer und den Staatsbehörden aufgenommen und erste organisatorische Leitlinien entworfen.

In Fragen der konkreten Begründung der Stiftungsabsicht war Mitch Scurtu mit dem fünf Jahre älteren Bruder des verstorbenen Dirigenten, dem Schriftsteller Hans Bergel, in Verbindung getreten. In Telefonkonferenzen wurde der Text für den in den USA veröffentlichten Aufruf zur Unterstützung der Stiftung erarbeitet; dabei ließ sich Hans Bergel u. a. durch einen vor wenigen Jahren veröffentlichten Würdigungsaufsatz der Klausenburger Cembalistin Gerda Türk für ihren Lehrer Erich Bergel sen. anregen. So gewannen Mitch Scurtu und Dorothy Kitchen Vertreter des Kunst-undöffentlichen Lebens, der Wirtschaft und des Universitätsbereichs für die Idee der "Foundation".

Der erste Wettbewerb findet Ende dieses Monats in Heltau statt (Beginn 26. März). Zu der von Musikern und Musikkennern aus den USA, Deutschland und Rumänien besetzten Jury gehört als Ehrenmitglied auch der Schriftsteller Hans Bergel. Vorbereitung und Durchführung der mehrtägigen Veranstaltung,

inklusive Betreuung der offiziell eingeladenen Gäste, liegen in den Händen Mitch Scurtus in Zusammenarbeit mit den städtischen Behörden. Der praktische Sinn der Amerikaner ermöglichte die rasche Realisierung des Vorhabens.

OUR FAVORITE RECIPES

from the SAXON COOKBOOK

PASTRIES (SAXON PIE) - HUNKLICH

As the Italians have their pizza, so do the Saxons have their Hunklich,in some parts of Transylvania, called Hanklich. Like pizza, Hunklich cannot be translated. Saxon Pie or Hunklich is an open-faced cream custard pie usually with fruit added, using an enriched raised dough crust. It is baked in a baking pan measuring 11x17 inches, 1 inch or more deep. The raised dough for the crust may be as simple as bread dough or as rich as desired, depending on taste and available ingredients.

The proportions of eggs, butter and sugar to the flour, therefore are varied. The cream custard for the filling consists of sour cream, eggs and sugar. Many Saxon cooks insist on using good, heavy sour cream direct from the farm. Many use commercial sour creams with good results. The number of eggs used varies with cooks. Some use as few as 2 eggs for 1 Hunklich, others use many more. The more you use, the better the filling.

We have received many recipes for Hunklich, but since they are just variations of the same ingredients , we will not attempt to give them all in detail. The ones given, will be sufficient to give you a good taste of this delicacy. Taste or necessity may inspire you to experiment and develop your own recipe.

SAXON PIE CRUST

Dough for Hunklich.

7 c. sifted flour 4 eggs, slightly beaten 2 cakes yeast (or 1 large cake) 3/8 lb. butter, melted 1/2 c. sugar

2 c. lukewarm milk 1 Tbsp. salt

Dissolve yeast in 1/4 cup lukewarm milk, adding a little of the sugar. Let rise for about 5 minutes. Pour rest of lukewarm milk into a large mixing bowl or pan. Add eggs, butter, sugar, salt, and the yeast. Mix well. Add flour and mix to a soft dough. Knead and beat air into dough until bubbles are formed. Cover. Let rise until double in bulk. Punch down and again let rise until double in bulk. Roll on floured board to 1/4 inch thickness to fit about an 11x17 inch baking pan. Place dough into greased pan. Let rise for about 15 minutes. Cover dough with a filling and bake as directed. This is enough dough for 2 Hunklichs or 1 Hunklich and 1 Nut Roll.

CHERRY SAXON PIE - KIRSCHEN HUNKLICH

1 qt. fresh sour cherries 5 eggs, separated (less if canned) 1/2 c. sugar 1 pt. heavy sour cream

Combine and mix well sour cream, egg yolks and sugar in mixing bowl. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Spread sour cherries evenly on raised dough in pan. Pour cream-egg mixture over all. Bake in moderate 350° oven until golden brown, about 1/2 hour.

Note: Sweet cherries may also be used.

APPLE SAXON PIE - APFEL HUNKLICH

Substitute apple slices for sour cherries in preceding recipe.

PLUM SAXON PIE - PELSEN HUNKLICH

Substitute plums (cut into halves) for sour cherries in preceding recipe.

IT'S TAX

It is time to remind our members to make their 2014 contribution into their ATS IRA by April 15th. If you do not have an ATS IRA and have earned income, we recommend that you start one now.

An ATS IRA is a smart way to save, combining two incredibly powerful forces, compounded interest and tax savings.

Both the Traditional IRA and Roth IRA allow you to enjoy tax advantages while saving for your future. Traditional IRA and Roth IRAs differ significantly in the way they are taxed.

With an ATS Traditional IRA, investment earnings are taxdeferred, so you pay tax only when you withdraw funds. Plus, contributions made to your Traditional IRA may be tax deductible. (Consult your tax advisor for details). There are ATS withdrawal charges for the first five years. But, there are no administrative fees. You are allowed a 10% penalty-free withdrawal each year. However, there is a 10% federal penalty tax if you're underage 59 1/2, unless an exception applies. Mandatory minimum distribution must begin at the age of 70 1/2.

With an ATS Roth IRAs, all withdrawals are tax free, including earnings, assuming you are over 59 1/2 years old and your account has been open for at least five years. There are certain eligibility requirements for establishing a Roth IRA, based on your Modified Adjusted Gross Income. Unlike, Traditional IRAs, contributions to Roth IRAs are never deductible (consult your tax advisor for details. There is no mandatory distribution age for a Roth.

There are exceptions for no penalty early withdrawals: To purchase a first home; for qualified education costs, if you become disabled, have unreimbursed medical costs in excess of 7.5% of annual income or need to pay health insurance premiums while
