Participation in this Jugendlager will be limited to five young people from each country. The USA Group Leader will be Heidi Weber, a member of Youngstown Branch 22. USA participants must be ATS members in good standing between the ages of 16 –19. Participant must have a valid passport and medical insurance. The Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons will provide the housing, meals and transportation during the Jugendlager. The ATS will pay the Participation Fee for each of the USA participants.

The reason each participant needs a valid passport is for travel to the 2015 Saxon Heimattag that will be held in Aylmer, Ontario, Canada, the weekend of July 10 - 12.

All applicants should be interested in sharing their family's Saxon traditions and be knowledgeable about the activities of their local branch and the national organization, the Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons.



May brings return of migratory birds to our localities

Millions of birds are in the process of migrating to the United States and Canada from their winter habitats in Central and South America. They are driven by their instinctive urge to return to their summer nesting grounds.

International Migratory Bird Day (IMBD) is May 9. The Smithsonian Bird Center originated the event in 1993, but it became the major education and conservation program of Environment for the Americas (EFTA) in 2007. Now, it highlights the habits of 350 migratory bird species in the Western Hemisphere.

This year's IMBD theme is "Restore Habitat, Restore Birds." It emphasizes the preservation and environmental efforts that directly affect migratory birds.

Why should you become a birder? Think about these inspiring facts:

- More than 251 species are recorded at the Chicago Botanical Garden, including flycatchers, tanagers, orioles, and up to 36 species of warblers.
- About 280 species are recorded in New York City's Central Park.
- Some 500,000 Sandhill Cranes and endangered whooping cranes use the Central Platte River Valley in Nebraska as a staging habitat during their migration to Canada and Alaska.
- More than 98 percent of the 338 species of migrants are recorded in Texas. May brings ruby-throated hummingbirds, sandpipers, yellow cuckoos, flycatchers and warbler species.
- Most of the 6,000 species of migratory songbirds are seen in May.
- An amazing 20 million shorebirds and waterfowl use the Copper River Delta during spring migration in April and May.
- Of the over 320 species of hummingbirds, only 26 are found north of Mexico. After flying across the Gulf, they migrate 20 miles per day. Their wings flutter 80 times per second, but not in flaps; in a figure eight, which enables them to fly backwards and to hover.

Migrating birds cover thousands of miles in their annual travels and have amazing navigational skills, including by the stars, sensing changes in the earth's magnetic field, and even by smell.

Consider tax breaks before using '529' funds

If you will have a college tuition bill this year, be sure to examine available tax credits before paying the whole bill from your 529 savings account.

A 529 savings account is a tax-advantaged account designed to help people save for college. It has become popular because savings earn interest over time and then when it's time to pay educational expenses, money can be used tax-free.

(A proposal by the Obama administration to eliminate the program has been withdrawn.)

Before you use all of your 529 savings on qualified education expenses, take into consideration the American Opportunity Tax Credit (AOTC), according to edvisors.com.

The AOTC can reduce your income tax bill by as much as \$2,500. You can claim an AOTC tax credit for all of the first \$2,000 of qualified education expenses, plus 25 percent of the next \$2,000. You don't want to leave the tax credit on the table by paying everything out of the 529 plan.

It's not available to wealthy taxpayers, but the income limits are higher than other options.

You can maximize your tax benefits by spending \$4,000 from your cash, savings, or loans for qualified education expenses. Then, any remaining expenses can be paid with money from your 529 plan.

Financial aid, scholar-ships and grants will reduce your qualified expenses. After taking them into account, focus on finding expenses that qualify for the AOTC credit. Room and board isn't a qualified expense but is usually an expense for 529-plan distributions.

If you drink a lot of bottled water and don't want to deal with the hassle of a pitcher water filter, consider installing an under-sink water filter. These systems are usually less than \$100 and provide filtered water right at the tap. Using this instead of buying bottled water can save you hundreds of dollars a year.

Wine Etiquette for Everyone

There are many people who enjoy wine but don't know a lot about how to choose it, serve it, or drink it. Here are some simple tips to help you navigate wine etiquette easily.

1. Trust your own tastebuds.

There are plenty of wine snobs who have strong opinions about certain wines, but you know what you like better than anyone. If you find a wine that tastes good to you, then be confident that it is an appealing wine. Knowing what you like and don't like is the key.

But this doesn't mean you need to know exactly which foodwine pairings work. Just offer both a white and red at each dinner. Then everyone can choose which they prefer for their own taste.

3. Get some nice glasses.

You don't need a different style of glass for every different type of wine, but it is good to have a few different types of glasses. Red wines are best served in taller and larger glasses than white wines. Dessert wines glasses are much smaller. With these three different styles, you can accentuate the best properties of each type of wine. When buying wine glasses, you'll also want to look for a sturdy construction that will hold up to everyday use and is dishwasher safe.



Versatile sausage bake tops any menu



A combination of sausage and sweet potatoes can be dressed up for dinner or sweetened for breakfast or brunch.

If you are on a diet, sweet potatoes might seem like a bad choice, but that's not exactly so.

The average sweet potato has fewer calories and carbs than a white potato. It also has more fiber. That is not to say that a sweet potato is low in carbs. Not so. The average sweet po-

tato has 26 carbs with 4 grams of fiber. That fiber number effectively decreases the carb load by 4.

This recipe is useful because it can be altered to suit your diet, preferences and even what you have on hand. This recipe is designed for brunch and calls for an apple and a dash of sugar. If you want to prepare this for dinner, leave out the sugar and add some red peppers and cream cheese.

Sausage and Sweet potato bake for 6

3 large sweet potatoes cubed 2 pounds chicken

or pork sausage
1 onion diced
1/4 cup olive oil
1 apple diced
1 tablespoon sugar
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon chili powder
salt and pepper

Preheat oven to 375. Cube the sweet potatoes and leave the skin on (Yes! you can

eat sweet potato skin)
Dice onions and apples
Cut sausage into bite sized

pieces, or if you are using ground sausage, pull it apart.

For pork sausage, add 1/2 the olive oil. Put everything into a plastic bag and shake well.

Pour into a 13x9 pan. Bake for an hour and then look at the sausage to make sure it is browned. Sweet potatoes should be done in an hour.


For brunch for two, use one sweet potato, 1 pound of sausage, and 1/8 cup of olive oil. You can use a whole apple if you want and just a quarter of an onion. Use spices to taste.

Trusting More As We Age

Researchers at Northwestern University have published the results of two studies that show that trust of other people increases as people age, which can be good for general well-being. The first study, conducted over 26 years, showed that older people had higher levels of trust of other people than younger people. Those study participants who had higher levels of interpersonal trust also reported higher levels of wellbeing. The second study was conducted to confirm these results. Participants were followed for four years and compared across age groups. This study also showed that interpersonal trust increased as we age.

There is a stereotype of the elderly becoming more cynical and suspicious, but these studies show otherwise. The researchers did not look to see why this might be, but they did speculate that it could be due to a number of factors. Older people tend to be more optimistic and forgiving of the small clashes of personalities they have with others. They also tend to be better judges of character, with this perhaps coming from a lifetime of experiences with both trustworthy and deceitful people.

There can be a downside however, such as when a senior citizen gets duped by a fraudster trying to steal from them. But overall, an increase in interpersonal trust has significant benefits to overall health and feelings of wellbeing.
