At the moment the Choir is on its summer break. I must say, it feels good not to have to watch the calendar and the clock and then hurry with Tuesday's chores.

We had practiced in preparation for the Maennerchor's "Liederabend" on May 30, 2015, the last of our performances until fall. Thanks to our director Andrea Ball, who, with much patience, brings us to the desired level of quality. Maennerchor, Damenchor, mixed choruses: the sounds they create are heartwarming.

In the preface to a textbook "Das Deutsche Lied", by Mr. Robert Oszlanyi, assistant professor of German at Cleveland State University, published by CSU in 1972, "wished to show how literary and musical productions are expressions of intellectual life and gave Germany its peculiar character". That peculiar character is the heartwarming quality, created by the different choirs.

Unfortunately, most of the German choirs in Greater Cleveland have folded because of dwindling, aging membership. And the future of the remaining few appears rather sad. In the Cleveland area we have younger immigrants from Germany; however, in conversations with them, we learn, their generation did not grow up with the systematic teachings of German songs. Thus, the lack of interest and enjoyment of "das deutsche Lied".

On June 3, 2015 the Choir held its semi-annual birthday celebration for all the birthday children of the first six months of the year. Our fleissige ladies (did you notice there is no perfect translation of our "fleis-

sig", a German characteristic) prepared a delicious dinner. And the bakery! Only Saxon mothers are able to produce such a variety of unique bakery.

On June 21, 2015 we remembered our fathers. Fathers can easily be overlooked; they are always there, always available, always helpful, always supportive. Gifts are not necessary; but a word of thanks goes a long way!

With sadness, we announce the death of one of our dearest members. Sara Ordosch died on May 23, 2015 at the age of 97. She had been a member for many, many years. At the Choir's social events she always recited poems, flawlessly, she had memorized in school. Sara is one of the very few persons in my lifetime, from whom I never heard a bad word about anyone. The Choir was dear to her heart. At her 95th birthday she invited the entire Choir to her party. It was obvious, she felt at home with her Saxon friends.

Home Tip

Gaze into your dog's eyes to see it New study shows that puppy love is real

When you gaze into the eyes of your puppy (or dog), you know you are communicating with your pet. Now, a new study shows that you and your dog are communicating chemically as well.

Japanese studies found that when a dog stares at its human, levels of a hormone called oxytocin rise.

The oxytocin, known as the "love hormone" for its role in parent-child bonding, encourages the human to gaze longer, which further increases the oxytocin in the dog, creating a feedback loop of happiness and connection.

A paper by Miho Nagasawa, a post doctural fellow at Jichi Medical University, says, "Dogs and humans can communicate very naturally, and they can be friends in a natural way."

In one study published in Science, when humans and their dogs were left alone for 30 minutes, dogs who gazed longer had extra oxytocin in their urine.

The same test was tried on wolves and their handlers. For them there was no gazing and no extra oxytocin.





New souped-up machines keep pinball rolling in the Internet age

It has its own history. Pinball grew out of an 18th-century French variation of billiards known as bagatelle. It had its heyday in the 1970s, becoming a fixture in arcades and malls.

Players controlled flippers to whack around steel balls. But with the emergence of video games in the 1980s pinball was kept alive only by a cult of fans, says The Wall Street Journal.

Game manufacturers, like Stern Pinball, Inc., started making machines that were more like video games, adding LED displays, intricate music tracks and features such as robots that pop up from the field.

The International Flipper Pinball Association in New York has 27,000 ranked players and holds 1,600 tournaments a year. The tournaments attract players from many countries.

At the one in Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, players are intensely competitive. One 51-year-old linguistics professor at Kent State University was thinking of hiring a hypnotist after her loss in a game. She says she practices 30 hours a week.

Recently-designed machines have more flexibility, allowing tournament organizers to set up tougher competitions. They wax the surface and raise the back legs of a machine to make balls travel faster.

Designers have opened up the sides so the machines can swallow balls. And they removed posts and bumpers to steer balls more swiftly toward the gutter.

Software for today's machines, which retail for \$5,000 to \$10,000, has introduced a host of adjustable features to create additional challenges. In a game based on "The Simpsons," hitting Otto 10 times makes the left flipper button control the right one. Gentle "nudging" or shaking the machine to one side to influence the path of the ball is allowed, but gives warnings. If a player shakes the machine too hard, it's a violation. Three violations result in losing a ball.



We all scream for ice cream!

Summer is the time for frozen treats, but whether you prefer ice cream, gelato or frozen yogurt, what you slurp has the same basic ingredients.

Milk and cream are the basis of all three frozen treats.

Yogurt is made with milk fermented with yogurt cultures with an base of cream, milk and sweetener.

From Italy, we get gelato, meaning frozen, and this treat is made entirely of milk. Since cream is mostly left out, it has enhanced flavor. The exceptionally creamy texture of gelato comes from the process. It is churned with very little air so it is dense and sweet.

Frozen custard is different from ice cream mainly because it contains a dash of egg yolk and more butterfat. The lechithin in the yolk gives the frozen cream a richer and creamier texture.

Sherbet has an ice

cream base sweetened with fruit juice.

Today we can thank refrigeration for making frozen treats widely available. More than 2,000 years ago, ice desserts were popular with the powerful. But even they had to run up to the top of the nearest mountain to get ice in the summer. King T'ang of Shang in China had 94 ice men to do the dirty work.

By the 1950s nearly every American had refrigeration and finally we could eat ice cream while watching Andy Griffith eat ice cream.

Still, some ice cream shops have been in business for generations: Doumar's in Norfolk, Graeter's in Cincinnati, Leopold's in Savannah, the Elliston Place Soda Shop in Nashville, Homer's in Wilmette, Illinois. The Fair Oaks Soda Fountain in South Pasadena, Calif., also whips up classics like old-fashioned phosphates and lime rickeys.
