Did you know the Liberty Bell was rung to announce the reading of the Declaration of Independence? The bell itself was constructed in 1751, to commemorate the 50-year anniversary of Pennsylvania's original constitution. It was cracked during a test and recast twice. The bell was hung in the Pennsylvania State House steeple in June 1753. This building was later renamed Independence Hall. The purpose of the bell was to call the Pennsylvania Assembly together

and to summon people for announcements special and events. Some of these events were King George III's ascension to the British throne in 1761, discussion of Parliament's controversial Stamp Act in 1765, and with the outbreak of the American Revolution in April 1775, it was rung to announce the battles of Lexington and Concord. Its most famous ringing occurred on July 8, 1776 when it summoned Philadelphia citizens for the first reading of the Declaration of Independence. As the British headed towards Philadelphia in the fall of 1777, the bell was removed from the city and hidden in Allentown to save it from the British melting it down and being used for cannons. After the British defeat in 1781, the bell was returned to Philadelphia. This city was the new nation's capital from 1790 to 1800. The bell tolled annually on George Washington's birthday on February 22 and the 4th of The name "Liberty Bell" was first coined in a poem inside an abolitionist pamphlet in 1839.

There has been a good deal of historical debate as to when the famous fracture occurred. The most commonly accepted account is the crack came while tolling for the funeral of the John Marshall, chief justice of the United States in 1835 and then expanded in 1846 on Washington's Birthday. After this, the bell was no longer rung but was tapped on occasions. On June 6, 1944 when the Allied forces invaded France, the bell's dulled ring was broadcast by radio across the United States. Did you catch that the bell was rung on July 8, and not the 4th of July for the reading of the Declaration of Independence? Although the document was adopted on the 4th, they were waiting until it was returned from the printer to be able to read it to the citizens of Philadelphia. That occurred on the 8th of July.

Sorry to report that Diana, our president, had a fall and has been incapacitated since. She is back in the hospital. Sending prayers to her.


Lucy and Marge also missed the meeting which was held on June 13th at Denny's in Austintown. Here's hoping you can make the July meeting.

GERMAN HISTORY COLUMBUS - RELIGION

This discussion is possible through reading 'The Columbus Germans' by La Vern J. Rippley, reading articles from the Columbus Dispatch, historical articles from the Columbus Public Library and the actual history in the church's directories, regarding religions in Central Ohio originating from German heritage.


As you would expect from your own German religious background, that the German places of worship were an important party of the German and the Columbus communities. It has been the very foundation of the German immigration. In some instances the religious organization originated from a various religious doctrines or from German organizations. Regardless, German's had the desire to make religion a main part of their lives, beliefs and in some cases as an extension or basis for education.

This article we will expand our discussions to include religions that may not have been part of our upbringing.

A large number of German immigrants came from the Rhine region in Bavaria, which was comprised of a large number of Catholics. There was no Catholic Diocese in Columbus so they first held their services in the home of Henry Nadenbusch. By 1833, the congregation had grown to twenty-one members. Their first actual services began in 1837 when Reverend Henry Damien Juncker arrived. Reverend Juncker was charged with the responsibility of building a stone church. Father William Schonat would replace him as the first permanent pastor. A structure was built on Rich and Fifth. Eventually, and after the arrival of Sisters, this structure of Holy Cross would be converted to a two-room schoolhouse. Holy Cross was the center of Catholic life in Columbus. The pastors of Holy Cross were

exclusively German until 1877. The second Catholic Church in Columbus was St. Patrick's, which began in 1852. St. Patrick's was a spin off of Holy Cross, and was predominantly an Irish sector. Subsequently, there was a spin off of St. Patrick's, St. Joseph's, which was also predominantly Irish.

The German Catholics of Holy Cross requested a more convenient location and the ability to build a school. In 1865, a one room building to hold services on Sunday and school during the week in southern part of Columbus. Upon the arrival of Father Francis Specht, an Osnabruck, German born assistant pastor, construction of a new church that would be independent of Holy Cross. They called the new Church St. Mary's was dedicated on November 29, 1868. St. Mary's became a large and prosperous church. Father Specht would deliver sermons in German and English.

Jumping ahead, there was tremendous growth of the German Catholics and Catholics in Columbus. The church had started an orphanage name Josephinum. In 1888 Josephinum also became a college for the priestly education of German-Americans, who lacked money to attend other seminaries. Today the seminary is no longer limited to German heritage. In 1895 the name was changed to 'The Pontifical College, Josephinum.' This is the only college in North America and one of only three in the world. Eventually, the school would relocate from East Main Street to a spacious location in Worthington on North High Street

German-Jewish population dates back to 1838, when a number of Jewish families would locate in Columbus. Unfortunately, no congregation was organized until 1851. In 1851, the orthodox society, B'nai Jeshuren began with Simon Lazarus serving as Rabbi. Simon Lazarus had immigrated to Columbus from near Nuremberg where he was born. In Bavaria, Simon had studied to become a Rabbi but later founded a clothing store instead. Upon arriving in Columbus Simon would start a clothing store on South High Street.

The Jewish services were held in humble beginnings above Twin Brothers-Gundersheim-Clothing Store and in other rented halls. In 1870, the congregation would receive local contributions and large support from Eastern States. A temple was erected at Main and Third Streets. The early Jewish congregation was entirely German and the serving Rabbis continue to be of German descent. This location served as a primary location until a larger facility was constructed on Bryden Road.

Services were conducted in Hebrew but the 'Protokoll Buch' was kept in German until 1879 when English was begun to be used. For a long time the congregation continued to be German.

Another Jewish community synagogue was Beth Jacob. It was comprised mainly of Russian-German Jews that had immigrated from Germany and South Russia. This group came to America in 1890. Through out their existence this group continued to us German in their records. The community synagogue was located on Washington Avenue, in the heart of German Village in South Columbus.

This concludes the Germans in Columbus history of religious affiliations. The next topic will discuss is the German-Swiss fraternal organizations and clubs of Columbus.

Keep your body in mind when tending the soil

Some surveys find that gardening is now the country's number one outdoor leisure activity. That's good, because it's a great way to engage in moderate and sustainable physical activity and reap all the health benefits.

Gardening can be therapy for worried minds. Being outdoors to work on a variety of garden activities boosts the mood and makes people feel good.

But all that digging and weeding can be hard on knees, hands, wrists, and shoulders. Digging with a garden trowel can cause ulnar deviation that leads to muscle strain and nerve pain in the wrist. Even so-called ergonomic tools don't help much, according to the Department of Occupational Therapy at the Medical University of Ohio. Through their studies, they have come up with this advice.

- Buy tools with thick handles. Single-handle tools like trowels should have handles that are 1-1/4 to 2 inches in diameter.
- Long handles are better. You can get a firmer grip on the tool if there is plenty of room for all your fingers.
- Look for tools that are both sturdy and lightweight. A flimsy tool makes for more work. But whatever the tool, the less it weighs, the easier it is on your body.
- Avoid transferring the stress. Some trowels include a frame around the hand keep the wrist straight. But a straight wrist can force the wrist and elbow into awkward, potentially physically stressful motions.

Experts say gardeners should also avoid getting into the "zone," where they lose track of time. According to the Harvard Health Letter, repetitive motions and staying in one position can cause muscle problems and aggravate arthritis. So make sure to stop, stretch, sit in a lawn chair, and have a drink of water.

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At last, Atari gets honors



About 45 years after its debut, Atari's Asteroids video game was one of five games to receive top honors in The World Video Game Hall of Fame in Rochester, New York.

The annual awards offer a glimpse into the business of gaming and its effect on culture.

Asteroids came out in 1979 as a coin-operated arcade game. At that time, 70,000 arcade units featured the space-themed rock-blasting game. The miracle activity that makes you stronger and happier

Here's a way to make yourself a little stronger, improve your heart health, boost your mood and thinking power, and provide a little adventure: E-bikes.

That's right, electric bikes, or ebikes. Those are pedal bikes fitted with a motor. There are also adult trikes that can be fitted with a motor.

According to a 2019 study from the UK, e-bikes might actually provide older adults with more physical and mental benefits than conventional bikes. A group of 100 older adults, ages 50 to 83, participated in the study. Half of the group rode conventional bikes, while the other half rode e-bikes. Each participant had to ride at least three times a week for thirty minutes. The e-bike riders showed similar or greater benefits than the pedal cyclists. Researchers concluded that the benefits come from both physical activity and engagement with the outdoor environment. E-bike riders could stay out longer and go more places, for one thing.

You might be wondering whether you can really work your muscles with an electric-powered bicycle. According to National Geographic, most riders use a low pedal assist power setting. Riders are pedaling, but not quite as hard -- which helps them cash in on a host of benefits. E-bike riders spend more time on their bikes and studies show they are generally happier. E-bike clubs also provide companionship on bike paths and trails.

E-bikes are available with a wide range of configurations and price points. You can buy an e-trike, such as the Liberty Trike, for about \$2,000. This very small foldable adult trike holds riders up to 300 pounds and can be used in some public places as a mobility device. Other bikes and trikes can retail from \$2,000 to as much as \$13,000. Generally speaking, lighter bikes come with higher price tags.

Easy bruising could just be lifestyle



Up to 55 percent of healthy people report they seem to bruise easily, but there is usually a simple explanation of why it happens.

Bruising occurs when blood vessels leak under the skin. The pool of blood forms a red, and eventually blue, mark on the skin. The body gradually reabsorbs the pooled blood and the mark fades.

The most obvious cause of bruising is an injury. You might get bruising from sports, exercise, or just your normal work when you run into things or other people.

Increased bruising is normal with age. Skin becomes thinner, and begins to lose elasticity. Older people may also lose the fat under the skin that cushions blood vessels, according to Health.com.

Medication can also increase bruising. Drugs like aspirin or ibuprofen can block the normal function of platelets, the part of the blood that binds to clotting factors. Blood-thinning medications like warfarin also cause bruising. Steroids taken for breathing problems, even if inhaled, can cause skin thinning, which is also associated with increased bruising.

Sun damage to the skin can weaken blood vessel walls, which can cause purple patches on the backs of hands and forearms.

Finally, there are some rare disorders that cause abnormal bleeding, including low blood platelet count, bleeding disorders, and blood cancers. Less rare is liver damage related to hepatitis C or alcohol use.
