What is Presidents Day? Why do we celebrate it?

On February 20, our nation will celebrate what is now referred to as Presidents Day. It is meant to honor and remember the past presidents of the U.S. and their contributions to creating the country it is today.

To many states, the day remains Washington's Birthday. February 22 is President George Washington's actual birthday. Our first president was elected to that post by a unanimous vote in 1789. His birthday was made a national holiday in 1885.

Often referred to as the Father of Our Country, Washington inspired his group of ragtag troops to victory over the British, and later presided over the Constitutional Convention. Both Washington D.C. and the state of Washington are named after him. The monument bearing his name is one of the most recognizable tributes in our nation's capital. The U.S. Senate takes a moment to read his Farewell Address every year, a tradition that dates back to 1862. Washington's Birthday is now celebrated on the third Monday of February each year, but to some states, it is known as Presidents Day. Advocates in the 1960s wanted to honor both Washington and President Abraham Lincoln, whose birthday is February 12, on a single federal holiday. Lincoln is known for his Civil War presidency during which he freed the slaves, but saw the nation break apart and begin the Civil War. His famous Gettysburg Address is considered one of the greatest speeches of all time. Contrary to popular belief, Washington's birthday has never been officially changed to Presidents Day.

Advice on learning and test-taking techniques that you can use

When it comes to taking important entrance exams for college or graduate school, students know that their futures depend on doing well.

The techniques that will help them make the most of their knowledge can be used later in life to prepare for a meeting with a committee, with customers, with the boss, or when taking tests for career advancement. Their advice:

* Eat right. You know that eating a breakfast of highcarb, slow-digesting foods like oatmeal are best for the day of a meeting or test. But what you eat a week in advance matters too. Researchers at the University of Oxford say a high-fat, low-carb diet heavy on meat, eggs and cheese can make performance decline.

* Test yourself repeatedly before an exam or a meeting where you will have to show your knowledge. It teaches the brain to quickly retrieve and apply knowledge from your memory. * Consider the facts and expertise you will need and how you will express them. Prepare in a quiet room without the distractions of music, text messages, TV and email.


* Sleep. Advisors at the sleep lab at the University of North Texas in Denton, recommend reviewing technical material just before going to sleep at night. It makes the information easier to recall.

* Don't wake yourself up earlier than usual. The last couple of hours of sleep are important and aid memory.

* Don't study or work all night. Psychologists at St. Lawrence University in Canton, N.Y., say it impairs memory and reasoning not for as long as four days afterward.

* Boost your confidence. Envision yourself discussing matters and answering questions calmly and confidently.

* Pace yourself and your replies to questions. Don't rush. Practice waiting a few seconds before answering and speaking more slowly.


Randy is presently stationed in Fort Knox, KY, and needless to say, his parents Jim and Janet are "glad to have him back in the 'good old USA.""



Breast prostheses and replacement joints set off Transportation Security Administration alarms, forcing passengers to explain their circumstances to guards with other passengers hearing them.





SALEM SAXON RETIREES By Sue Fritzman †

Sadly, this is the last article to be printed in my mother's honor as it is written in Sue's last words. She had come up with the following topics to be printed a few weeks before her passing on January 25th. Mom was so saddened when she had to give up her title as Retiree's Secretary, as she could no longer physically attend the meetings to take the minutes. I appreciate the Retirees letting her keep her title as reporter so she could continue her writings, for they were such an important part of her life for so many years.

I called the "Volksblatt" office and left a message that yes, there would still be an article, and to save room for the printing, even though she had passed. OUR FAVORITE RECIPES

Fat Tuesday is February 21st - the last day before we begin the Lenten season. How about making a batch of fresh Krapfen for your Mardi Gras celebration? There is nothing like a fresh batch of Krapfen (doughnuts).


Krapfen (Doughnuts)

1/8 lb. or large cake of yeast 1 cup warm water 5 lb. flour 1 cup sugar

2 Tbsp salt 1 qt. milk $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. butter 8 eggs

Dissolve yeast in warm water. Let stand. Sift dry ingredients into large pan. Heat milk and butter and mix with whole eggs. Add part of milk, butter and egg mixture with (about 2/3) to the flour, stirring until all of the flour is mixed. Add dissolved yeast and knead until smooth. Add the remaining liquid mixture and again knead until smooth. Lift dough from bottom of pan when kneading, beating in air until bubbles are formed. Cover and let rise in warm place until double in bulk. Punch down or fold dough; let rise again until double in bulk. Roll dough 1/2 inch thick on floured board and cut with large round cutter. Let rise about 15 to 20 minutes. Fry in deep hot fat (around 375 degrees F) on both sides until golden brown. May be sprinkled with powdered sugar before serving.

The secret of making good Krapfen is the necessity of beating enough air into the dough when kneading it until bubbles are formed.



never cook because they don't have the time, and 66 percent say they don't cook because they hate to visit the supermarket, which they say takes more time than any other household



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Home heating safety with fireplaces, woodstoves and gas logs

The United States Fire Administration (a division of FEMA) reports that one in three American homes use fireplaces, wood stoves or gas logs as their primary heat source.

Many users are not aware of the dangers involved in heating with wood and other fuels. Each year, heating fires account for 36 percent of home fires in rural areas. Most of these fires were caused by creosote buildup in chimneys and stovepipes.

Whether you live in the country or in the city, creosote can cause a fire. Whether you use your fireplace or gas log as a main heating source, or just to make a winter's evening cozy. Have your chimney inspected every year.

Woodstoves

As energy prices rise, more homeowners who have access to wood, or don't mind chopping it, are installing woodstoves. In some areas, buying wood by the cord is less expensive than heating with oil or gas.

Always buy an EPA-certified woodstove and have it properly installed.

* Burn only dry, seasoned wood and store it outdoors, stacked off the which is designed to turn off the gas



it outside.

* Never burn anything but uncoated, untreated wood, no particle board, wood with glue, or moldy wood.

* Install and maintain a carbon monoxide detector.

Gas logs

Gas fireplaces require routine maintenance and service by a factory trained professional, who will adjust the millivolt output, clean the embers and fan, and check your carbon monoxide detector.

Unvented logs are always equipped with an Oxygen Depletion Sensor,
