Small lottery bets have entertainment value and more

Historians say the American Revolution was financed in part by lotteries, and so was Harvard, so lotteries have a peculiar place in American history.

Last year, we wagered \$58.8 billion on them, according to the North American Association of State & Provincial Lotteries (NASPL). The 43 states and District of Columbia that allow lotteries kept about \$18 billion in profits.

When you buy a Powerball ticket, you know your chances of winning are 1 in 195 million, but where else do you have a chance to win a life-changing lump of money for a couple of dollars?

Writing in Time, Bill Saporito says he saves for a rainy day and sticks to a low-risk investment portfolio, but that approach won't give him the dream benefits that cashing his lotto check would.

Economists at the University of Maryland say that while

state lotteries take a small percentage of household income, for the majority of players, lottery tickets represent an entertainment or consumption value. The fact that it isn't a positive return doesn't necessarily mean it's an irrational choice.

The standard advice is that putting the money into a mutual fund or savings account would be a better choice. That's wise, but if you redirected your lottery spending to stocks over the 10 years ending December 2010, your annualized return would have amounted to a 1.54 percent loss, according to Standard & Poor's.

Saporito says he will continue to buy his \$4 worth of lottery tickets every week. He knows rationally that he will never win the big one. But he enjoys thinking about how he would spend the jackpot and says there are even more foolish ways to waste money.





Valentine's Day has mysterious, romantic origins

On February 14, lovers, friends and family members exchange Valentine cards or gifts as tokens of caring and love. Valentine's Day is one of the most romantic days of the year.

Its history, however, is shrouded in mystery. One legend contends that Valentine was a priest who served during the third century in Rome. When Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made the best soldiers, he outlawed marriage for young men. Valentine defied Claudius and performed marriages for young lovers in secret. When it was discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death.

According to another legend, Valentine sent the first valentine greeting himself. While in prison, he fell in love with a young girl who often visited him. Before his death, he wrote her a letter, which he signed "From your Valentine."

Others claim that the Christian church celebrated Valentine's feast day in February to compete with celebrations of the pagan Lupercalia festival, which began on February 15.



It was a fertility festival dedicated to Faunus, the Roman god of agriculture.

In Great Britain, Valentine was one of the most popular saints. Valentine's Day began to be celebrated in the seventeenth century. By the 18th century, it was common for friends and lovers to exchange tokens of affection or handwritten notes. Some years later, printed cards began to replace written letters. They were an easy way to express emotions in a time when direct expression of one's feelings was discouraged.

In the 1840s, Esther A. Howland began to sell the first mass-produced valentines in America. According to the Greeting Card Association, an estimated 1 billion valentine cards are sent each year, making Valentine's Day the second largest card-sending holiday of the year. About 2.6 billion cards are sent for Christmas.

ADHD treatment

Between 2001 and 2010, there was a pronounced increase in medications used to treat ADHD among young and middleaged adults.

Use in the over-65 group also increased about 30 percent for men and women.

Reasons for the rise could include people who were diagnosed and treated as children who continue to suffer from symptoms; adults who were never treated previously but suspect they have symptoms, and increased awareness that ADHD is a lifelong disorder, according to Medco Neuroscience Therapeutic Resource Center.

One 30-year-old man said after starting a medication, he was able to fully shift his attention from one situation to another and could plan what he would do next, rather than get distracted. He said there was a big difference in his life.

SNOWSTORM, GRUENE BOHNEN SUPPE By John G. Waffenschmidt

Saturday October 29th, my daughter Bianca was playing a soccer game against our arch rival. The game started off with threatening precipitation and ended with wet snow. I had bundled myself sufficiently and was able to exist quite comfortably under a golf umbrella sitting on a canvas fold up chair. Unfortunately they lost 1-0. After a bowl of soup we tried to go see Marist college, only to be deterred by increasingly snowy conditions and limited prospects of getting there for a quality tour; consequently, we headed home. About 2:15 I was making us some burgers on the deck. By then there was enough heavy wet snow to start breaking branches. There was a continual chorus of snapping branches; I would swivel my head and catch about a third of them falling. At 3:30 the lights went out, which I had expected and surmised that this would be a long outage. Bianca was doing college applications and generally not in a great mood given the loss earlier in the day. With no lights and barely passable roads, she developed a dismal view of her day with her Dad. Having located a friend with lights and heat, Dad did the drive in the Subaru (4 wheel drive) over to her friend's house. Just down the block the kids had set up a barricade with snowmen in the street – no problem zipped around them. The half mile ride to her friend's house offered the vision of 5 downed limbs and 3 downed wires; these were on the road. Mmmm. Back to the home, alone, since Pat was with Johnny in Saratoga for a crew (boat racing) event, I pondered my night ahead. Figured I'd get the wood stove going before dark. Went to get wood, looked up at the branches and thought, could break on me which would be a drag given I was alone; I would later think that was a thought process I wished my dear friends Jim and Dawn would learn. With the fire underway, semi comfort was anticipated.

We had had a good string bean year in the garden, harvesting 10-15 pounds a week around the peak. In my quest for a garden to table lifestyle, I vacuum sealed lots of them (certainly more than the family wanted to see) and put them in the refrigerator. Problem was some of them were off gassing – my first thought was 'oh well' my second thought was 'OH NO! it could be botulism'. This set me on the quest of knowledge-CDC (Centers for Disease Control), Food and Drug Administration, Dept of Health, 45 page PowerPoint, calls to agencies, on the internet, etc. Bottom line, not much info or folks who can answer my questions, though I ultimately conclude that 1) chances are small generally, and 2) boiling for about 10 minutes ensures the bug dies. I also figure I will throw out any that have significantly off gassed. Anyway, Pat suggested that I better cook the beans soon or we would lose them. My Mom

had made a bean soup when was a kid; I figured I would Google a recipe. The first one I looked was a Transylvanian Saxon (my nationality) recipe Wow . I recalled my folks had a Transylvanian Saxon cookbook. I pulled that out as well as rummaged through the other cookbooks. Hooked at the ingredients and said 'this will taste good?' - vinegar, flower, bacon, sour cream? A little doctoring - no bacon, sour cream as an add in and I had a plan.

Back to the snowstorm - no power, no heat, no family - guess I will make a bunch of soup. Using a camp lantern and matches to light the stove I make beans in one pot, garlic and onions in another, see the attached photo. The entire process is assisted by liquid direct injection of an American malt beverage (Yuengling). The beans look like a pot of beans - 'this will taste good?' I mix the flour in the onions and put it all together. It looks edible; now the taste test. I put a bit in a bowl and give it a taste-'Gruene Bohnen Suppe' (Green Bean Soup in German, that is what my Mom called the soup) tastes like what my Mom

made. I am so excited. I want to call my cousins in Germany, except I have no phone service, no direct, immediate knowledge of how to do it, their numbers, and my limited phone German makes a two sentence conversation a success. So using my cell I called my Aunt and one of my cousins and said 'I made Gruene Bohnen Suppe'. I had been monitoring the sump pump and figured I would set up the generator once the water got near the top of the sump. Ultimately I got up at 1:30 and hooked everything up. We ended up with no power for 71 hours. Everyone thought since I mountaineer and backpack, it would be a breeze. To a certain extent that was true, but it was a hassle.

Green beans 3 Tb sp. flour 1 clove garlic Chopped onion 1 sprig parsley Sour cream 2 slices bacon Vinegar

Cook until tender a pot full of nice young green beans in mildly salted water with garlic and parsley. Fry bacon. Remove from frying pan when crisp. To hot bacon grease add some chopped onion and flour, stirring until brown and smooth. Add some of the water from the beans slowly, stirring constantly to prevent lumps. Cook a bit, then add this thickening to soup and bring to a boil. Add crisp bacon, sour cream and vinegar to taste. Serve with a little chopped parsley, if desired.

DIE DEUTSCHE SEITE

Die Evangelische Kirche A.B. in Rumänien Kurze Geschichte

Als "Kirche der Siebenbürger Sachsen" reicht die Geschichte dieser Kirche mehr als 850 Jahre zurück. Im 12. Jahrhundert ließen sich deutsche Siedler aus der Rheinund Moselgegend in Siebenbürgen nieder. Gerufen zur Verteidigung der Grenzen und zur Erschließung des Landes, gründeten sie Dörfer und bauten Städte. Die Gotteshäuser waren zugleich Zufluchtsort und wurden deshalb immer mehr zu Wehrkirchen und Kirchenburgen umgebaut, die heute ein charakteristisches Merkmal der siebenbürgischen Landschaft sind.

Zwischen 1542 und 1550 fand die lutherische Reformation in Siebenbürgen statt, die die Sachsen geschlossen annahmen. Der theologische und organisatorische Wortführer des reformatorischen Gedankenguts war der Kronstädter Humanist Johannes Honterus. 1550 wurde die lutherische Kirche offiziell anerkannt. Der Name Evangelisch A.B. bedeutet Evangelisch Augsburgischen Bekenntnisses Die Verkündigungssprache ist seit der Reformation Deutsch (bzw. Mundart).

Die Bischöfe der Evangelischen Kirche residierten von 1572 bis1867 in Birthälm, ab dann in Hermannstadt.

Das Gemeindeleben war mit dem kirchlichen Leben eng verwoben. Die Gemeinden waren in Nachbarschaften organisiert, deren gewählte Vertreter über ein geregeltes Gemeindeleben wachten. Wenn zu verschiedenen Anlässen öffentlich gesprochen werden musste, so geschah das ebenfalls nach festen Regeln. So erhielt sich auch ein bemerkenswertes Versöhnungsritual. Vor der Teilnahme am heiligen Abendmahl fand innerhalb der Nachbarschaft eine Versöhnungsfeier statt.

Nachdem die Siebenbürger Sachsen 1876 ihr Recht auf politische Selbstvertretung verloren hatten, nahm die Kirche vermehrt auch Belange der gesamten Gruppe wahr. 1900 beschäftigte die Evangelische Kirche über 1000 Lehrer in ihren eigenen Schulen.

1945-1948 wurde im Zuge der "Nationalisierung" auch die Evangelische Kirche enteignet (Schulen, Grundstücke, Wälder). Allein die Kirchgebäude blieben ihr erhalten. Alle Vereine (wie zum Beispiel der Evangelische Frauenverein) wurden aufgelöst.

1955 konnte das Protestantisch-Theologische Institut mit Universitätsgrad in Klausenburg gegründet werden. An dessen deutschsprachigem Zweig in Hermannstadt wurden die Pfarrer, und seit 1994 auch Pfarrerinnen, un-Kirche ausgebildet. serer Seit 2006 kann evangelische Theologie an der staatlichen Lucian-Blaga-Universität in Hermannstadt studiert werden (Departement für evangelische Theologie).

Die kirchliche Unterweisung der Kinder konnte trotz einiger Einschränkungen auch während der Zeit der kommunistische Diktatur (1945-1989) gewährleistet werden. Die Zunahme der konfessions- und zugleich sprachverschiedenen Ehen brachte es mit sich, dass bei Kasualien immer öfter auch die rumänische Sprache verwendet wird. In einigen Ortschaften gibt es Konfirmandenunterricht in rumänischer Sprache und auch Gottesdienste für rumänischsprachige Gemeindeglieder.

Nach dem Fall des Eisernen Vorhangs wanderten im Jahr 1990 zwei Drittel der evangelischen Gemeindeglieder nach Deutschland aus. Im Jahr 2006 sind das rund 14.300.

Die neue Kirchenordnung berücksichtigt den Wandel von einer "Volkskirche" zu einer "Diasporakirche". Die wesentlichen Aufgaben Kirche sind: die Verkündigung des Wortes Gottes und die Verwaltung der Sakramente, die Seelsorge und Diakonie, die Unterweisung der Kinder und der Jugend, der schulische Religionsunterricht, das Verwalten und Bewahren der Archiv- und Kulturgüter, die ökumenische Zusammenarbeit mit Kirchen im In- und Ausland.

Die Kirche versucht in ihrem gesellschaftlichen und politischen Kontext lutherische Identität fruchtbar zu machen und das reformatorische Zeugnis weiterzugeben.

Russland-Deportation in der Schule / Neue Internetseite

Die Deportation zum Ende des Zweiten Weltkrieges ist bis heute das große Trauma der deutschen Minderheit in Rumänien. Rund 70 000 Menschen wurden im Januar 1945 ausgehoben und nach Russland deportiert, darunter mehr als 30 000 Siebenbürger Sachsen. Mit dieser Zeit befasste sich 2010 und 2011 ein rumänienweites Schülerprojekt, dessen Ergebnisse seit kurzem im Internet präsentiert werden. Besucher der Internetseite finden eine Auswahl an historischen Dokumenten, Interviews mit Zeitzeugen sowie Untersuchungen über die Rezeption der Deportationen in der rumäniendeutschen Literatur, die im Projekt "Aus der Vergangenheit lernen. Deportation von Rumäniendeutschen in die Sowjetunion im Januar 1945 "zusammengetragen wurden.

Initiiert wurde das Projekt vom damaligen Unterstaatssekretär im Departement für Interethnische Beziehungen in Bukarest, Helge Fleischer. Als Unterstützer gewann er das Demokratische Forum der Deutschen in Rumänien, die Friedrich-Ebert-Stiftung und den Nationalen Rat für das Studium der Securitate-Archive (CNSAS).

Ziel des Vorhabens war es, junge Menschen, die an deutschsprachigen Bildungseinrichtungen in Rumänien lernen, für das Thema Deportation zu sensibilisieren. Teilgenommen haben Schüler des Nikolaus-Lenau-Lyzeums in Temeswar, des Johann-Ettinger-Lyzeums in Sathmar und des Brukenthal-Gymnasiums in Hermannstadt sowie Germanistik-Studenten der Hermannstädter Lucian-Blaga-Universität.

Zu den eindrücklichsten Dokumenten zählen sicherlich die Interviews der Zeitzeugen, die die Schüler auf Tonband aufgezeichnet haben. Der Banater Schwabe Ignatz Fischer etwa erinnert sich an den Weg nach Russland und einen Fluchtversuch aus dem Lager. Magdalena Steinbinder, Elisabeth Wolf und Gustav Schemmel berichten von der Zeit im Lager. Johann Forstenheizler und Sigrid Haldenwang geben in Interviews Auskunft über ihre Kindheit, die sie ohne Eltern

Schutz der Urwälder in Rumänien



Vorher hatte er zusammen mit seinem Kollegen Mihai Ciolan (beide kommen aus der Moldau) und zum Teil auch mit dem Abt Ilarion Urs aus dem siebenbürgischen orthodoxen Kloster Sâmbăta de Sus Weihnachts- und Neujahrslieder dargeboten. Die drei Popen waren eigens für die Vernissage nach Rheinbach gekommen. Die beiden Priester ließen mit ihren markanten Stimmen weitere Lieder folgen, darunter auch typische rumänische Trink- und Liebeslieder. Zur Schlussveranstaltung nach Rheinbach war auch der rumänische Generalkonsul aus Bonn, Dr. Vlad Vasiliu, gekommen.

Die im Glasmuseum Rheinbach unter dem Titel "Fenster zum Himmel" präsentierten Hinterglas-Ikonen stammen aus dem Wallfahrtskloster Sâmbăta. Zur Ausstellungseröffnung am ersten Advent waren drei Malermönche aus Sâmbăta gekommen, die Pater Mihail, Stefan und Siluan, um den Museumsbesuchern die Kunst der Ikonen-Hinterglasmalerei vorzuführen. Die Herstellung einer Glasikone dauert etwa sechs Tage. Vom Übertragen des Motivs auf das Glas bis zur letzten Farbgebung mit Blattgold sind einige Schritte notwendig. Die Einnahmen von der Verkostung der rumänischen Spezialitäten nach der Finissage kommen Kinderhilfsprojekten der Heiner-Buttenberg-Stiftung zugute. Der Unternehmer Heiner Buttenberg, der im Rheinbacher Nachbarort Meckenheim ein Hotel betreibt, setzt sich in Rumänien für verwaiste und verwahrloste Kinder ein. Die Buttenberg-Stiftung betreibt im Banater Kurort Busiasch das Kinderdorf Hänsel und Gretel, zu dem unter anderem ein Kinderheim, ein Mutter-Kind-Haus, eine Sozialküche und eine Ausbildungswerkstatt für Schreiner und Maler gehören.






