Johann Leprich (1925-2013)

Johann Leprich of Clinton Township, Michigan, died at the age of 87 on February 10. 2013. His funeral was held Wednesday, February 13, at St. Peter Lutheran Church in Warren, Michigan with Pastor Waldemar Gies officiating. Burial was in Cadillac Memorial Gardens East.

John is survived by his wife, Maria; his son, John, of Richmond, Michigan; his daughter, Trudi (Ralph Barthel), of Clinton Township, Michigan; his brother, Michael (Susanna), of Clinton Township, Michigan; grand-children Stacey and Scott; and five great, grandchildren.

A native of Birk, Siebenbuergen, Johann was raised there by parents Johann and Susanna (Dienesch) Leprich. During World War II he was conscripted into the German army, serving in Austria. On March 29, 1952 the whole family including his grand-parents, his parents and his brother, Mike, landed in New York City after a voyage of eleven days. They were sponsored by a family who owned a nursery in Whitestone, New York. Maria Lindert, his intended, joined him there in 1953 and they were married May 23 by Pastor Maas in the Lutheran Church.

In 1956 Johann and Maria moved to Detroit where Johann worked at Conveyor Engineering. He remained there until his retirement in 1987. Johann was a hard worker, even working two jobs for a time in order to support his family.

Johann, a family man, enjoyed also fishing, wine-making, singing, and baseball. He enjoyed the games of the Detroit Tigers. A religious person, Johann was a member of St. Peter Lutheran Church, never missing a Sunday if possible. He was also a member of Branch 37. Filling the extra years with fun and productivity

Jim Toedtman, editor of the AARP The Magazine, knows many stories about successful retirement.

His favorite involves his own grandfather, John F. Smith, who was a professor of speech and drama for many years at Otterbein College in Westerville, Ohio.

At age 70, this active man was forced to retire, as was the college's custom. The next day, he applied for a custodian job at the college gymnasium. He was hired right away.

Smith became the subject one magazine story entitled "He traded his cap and gown for a mop."

He was once interviewed by CBS television newsman Charles Kuralt. Kuralt asked him which job was more rewarding. Toedtman's grandfather replied that every age of life has its own compensations and he was still looking ahead. He said, "There's too much fun in this world and a lot of good folks. And good books to read and fish to catch and pretty women to admire and good men to know. Why, life is a joy."

Smith said his transition to a custodian was simple. He knew what a mop was and what a bucket was. It was hard work, but he tried to do it well. He did that job for 15 years.

ATS GENEALOGY MESSAGE BOARD

Many of our members are interested in tracing their family history and have often contacted the ATS Office for help. We do not have the records to help in tracing your family tree, but we can offer you a place to ask for help from other members. Under this column, you can submit a short paragraph requesting help in searching for family members. When possible be specific on names, places and dates. Send your short request to the ATS Home Office, 5393 Pearl Road, Cleveland, OH 44129 or email us at office@ atsaxons.com. Include your name, email and/or phone number that you want listed in the *Volksblatt* that members may contact you directly.

I am interested in finding out where in Transylvania my grandmother came from and/or where she was born and when she left to come to the United States. She, Susanna Blam, was born 4-16-1880 in Transylvania. She married our grandfather on May 9, 1903 at the Emanuel Lutheran Church in Salem, Ohio. Her address remained Salem, Ohio. She passed away 3-4-60.

(My Dad and aunts and uncles are deceased, however, the story was, she left Transylvania with a girlfriend when she was 16, came into Ellis Island and ended up in Cleveland Ohio where she lived until she met and married my grandfather). We know she had a brother, Mike Blam, who also came to the US at some point, who lived in Martins Ferry, Ohio. I do not have his birth date. I was told their parents' names were Mike and Susanna Blam, and as far as I know they remained in Transylvania.

I have looked at the Ellis Island passenger records. The only name that is remotely close to Susanna Blam is Susa Blam, age 21 from Grossau, Hungary, ship Koenigin Luise, Port of Departiere - Bremen, Manifest Line # -0024. Arrived at Ellis Island Feb. 27, 1903.

My grandfather, Paul Drotleff, was born 3-7-1877 to Paul Drotleff and Sofia Nementz Drotleff. According to his obituary, he came to the US in 1898. He was a member of the Emanuel Lutheran Church, Salem, Ohio, a member of the Transylvanian Saxon Society and the German Beneficial Union. He died and was buried in Salem 5-17-1938. He had a brother, John Drotleff, born 10-6-1887, died 1-4-1944. He also had a brother named Andrew Drotleff who died in 1961 and possibly a brother named George Drotleff, born in 1881. His parents, my great grand parents, Paul Drotleff and Sofia Nementz Drotleff, are buried at Hope Cemetary, Salem Ohio. Inscribed in their head stone is Reichesdorf. A distant cousin has done some investigation on John Drotleff on ancestry.com. It lists my great grandfather, Paul Drotleff as being born 1848 in Reichesdorf, Sieberburgen Transylvania Austria, Hungary and my great grandmother, Sofia Nementz Drotleff as being born 1854, also in Reichesdorf Siebengurgen, Transylvania Austria, Hungary. It also lists her arriving in NY in 1899 at the age of 45. I have yet to find any passenger records for Paul, Sofia, Paul, John, Andrew or George.

I would like to confirm where in Transylvania my grandfather was from and the date he came to the US if possible

Also, does anyone have a detailed map of Transylvania prior to 1900 that they wouldn't mind sharing with me or anyone that can tell me where I might search for one?

Joe was related to my grandfather, Wilhelm Kamilli, from Schaessburg or Eppeschdorf. Also seeking information on Waldemar Froehlich, from Kronstadt, who may still be living in Romania or Germany - he would be my mother's cousin.

Also seeking information on or contact with Helen (nee Heugel) Atkinson, born about 1924 in New Jersey, or her descendants. Her mother and my mother were cousins, from Schäßburg.



Ks Tax Time

It is time to remind our members to make their 2012 contribution into their ATS IRA by April 15th. If you do not have an ATS IRA and have earned income, we recommend that you start one now.

An ATS IRA is a smart way to save, combining two incredibly powerful forces, compounded interest and tax savings.

Both the Traditional IRA and Roth IRA allow you to enjoy tax advantages while saving for your future. Traditional IRA and Roth IRAs differ significantly in the way they are taxed.

With an ATS Traditional IRA, investment earnings are taxdeferred, so you pay tax only when you withdraw funds. Plus, contributions made to your Traditional IRA may be tax deductible. (Consult your tax advisor for details). There are ATS withdrawal charges for the first five years. But, there are no administrative fees. You are allowed a 10% penalty-free withdrawal each year. However, there is a 10% federal penalty tax if you're underage 59 1/2, unless an exception applies. Mandatory minimum distribution must bagin at the age of 70 1/2.

With an ATS Roth IRAs, all withdrawals are tax free, including earnings, assuming you are over 59 1/2 years old and your account has been open for at least five years. There are certain eligibility requirements for establishing a Roth IRA, based on your Modified Adjusted Gross Income. Unlike, Traditional IRAs, contributions to Roth IRAs are never deductible (consult your tax advisor for details. There is no mandatory distribution age for a Roth.

There are exceptions for no penalty early withdrawals: To purchase a first home; for qualified education costs, if you become disabled, have unreimbursed medical costs in excess of 7.5% of annual income or need to pay health insurance premiums while unemployed. (consult your tax advisor for details.)
