Also, the same form holds good for any of our members who would like to, but are not receiving the newspaper. If you are a member in good standing, you are entitled to receive our publication.





A highlight of the ATS Convention is the Saxon Handicraft Exhibit. The Exhibit this year will be held at the Youngstown Saxon Club, where the ATS Convention will meet on June 2 - 3, 2012.

The Junior Category, which allows our junior members, ages 13 and under, to exhibit their handcrafted items in an open category, will once again be a part of the Exhibit. All members competing in this category will receive a small token of appreciation.

The Handicraft Exhibit provides an opportunity to display articles which relate to our Transylvanian Saxon cultural background, but is not restricted to this category only. It is a showplace for the artistic talents and abilities of our people, present and past.

A prize competition is held for items made by present ATS Members only. The rules for this prize competition are as follows:

- 1. There will be prize competition in ten (10) categories.
- 2. There will be first and second prizes awarded in each category.
- 3. There will be one (1) President's

Award for "Best of Show" Entry.

- 4. No more than three (3) entries allowed per member.
- 5. Only items actually made by present ATS members, ages 14 and over, are eligible for entry in this prize competition.
- 6. Winning entries will be determined by ballot vote of the Convention Delegates.
- 7. There will be a separate Junior Category for ATS members, Ages 13 and under.

NOTE: An Entry Blank must be filled out for all items placed on display. Advance registration will be appreciated. The exhibit room will be opened Saturday morning (June 2nd) for delivery and set-up of display items. All items must be picked up Sunday morning (June 3rd) prior to the start of the Sunday Convention Session.

SAXON SUMMER CAMP

At Camp Frederick Rogers, Ohio Ages 8 - 13 July 8 - 13, 2012



Summer is rapidly approaching and the ATS Youth Activities Committee is busy preparing activities for our junior members. One of these activities is the Saxon Summer Camp, which offers our Junior Members and friends, ages 8-13, the opportunity to spend a week together in fellowship and fun at the beautiful Camp Frederick located in Rogers, Ohio.

Camp Frederick is an organized camp center on 144 acres of forest, rambling streams, rolling hills, glacial rocks and meadow. It is located at the Ohio, Pennsylvania and West Virginia borders. The Camp is staffed with trained and experienced counselors.

Our Saxon campers will be housed in cabins which accommodate eight persons. Last year the children really enjoyed their stay in cabins.

Camp will include swimming, wall climbing, archery, crafts, nature exploration, cooking outdoors and more. One evening will be devoted to Saxon folk dancing and a discussion on Saxon traditions.

Detailed information and registration forms have been mailed directly to our members, ages 8-13. Regina Weber (1925-2012)

Regina Weber, 87, of Centerline, Michigan, died April 25, 2012 at St. John Hospital in Warren, Michigan. Her funeral was held Saturday, April 28 at St. Peter Lutheran Church, Warren, Michigan with Pastor Waldemar Gies officiating. Burial was at Gethsemane Cemetery, Detroit. A.H. Peters Funeral Home, Warren, made the arrangements.

Regina was predeased by her husband, Johann, in 1974 and her brother, Georg Ludwig, February 2012. Surviving her are sister Marianne Puiac and brother Friedrich Ludwig, of Regensburg, Germany, and sister Katharina Barth, of Scheinfeld, Germany. Also surviving Regina are her children, Richard (Sheila) Weber, of Houston, Texas; Waltraut "Trudy" (Alex) Alexandridis, of Orchard Lake, Michigan; Gerhard "Geri" (Carmen) Weber, of Shelby Township, Michigan; and Inge (Uwe) Sturm of Blanchard, Michigan. Her grandchildren are Stephanie and Michael Weber; Alexis and Paul Alexandridis: Andres. Alain, and Lars Weber; and Amber Sturm. She also had one great grandchild, Hunter Sturm.

On October 15, 1969 the Weber family emigrated to the United States, to the city of Sterling Heights, sponsored by Johann's brother Michael Weber.

After her husband's death in 1974. Regina continued working at Gerhard's Meat on Harper Avenue and subsequently for several years at Buchholtz Imports & Delicatessen. She was also an integral part of the Alexandridis family raising her grandchildren Alexis and Paul.

Regina was a friendly, caring person and will be greatly missed by her family, her Saxon Club, St. Peter's Lutheran Church and Senioren Kreis

Following is an excerpt from the eulogy prepared for her funeral by her family and Pastor Gies:

Regina was born on March 26, 1925, in Nadesch, Transylvania/Romania. She was a Siebenbuerger Saechsin, the oldest of Johann and Regina (nee Kloos) Ludwig's five children. Her childhood was happy. filled with school, work, and the rich cultural traditions of the Saxons.

All that came to an abrupt end in 1939, when her father was drafted into the German Army.

Being now without a father and having a frail and sickly mother, Regina started to assume more and more of a "Landwirt's" (peasant/farmer) responsibilities. Still, life was good in Nadesch and what remained with her were the joyful moments, the singing, the dancing, and the social camaraderie.

Then, in January 1945, she, along with thousands of other Saxon men and women, was deported to the USSR, where she spent five years, doing hard labor. While she did not forget the horrors of life in the labor camps, she remembered fondly the Christmas or Easter celebrations she and her fellow-deportees staged each year (i.e., an effort to humanize the camps). After returning to Nadesch in late December, 1949, Regina married Johann "Butter-Hans" Weber, on May 1, 1950. She and Hans had four children: Richard, Waltraud, Gerhard, and Inge. Life under the Communist dictatorship was not easy. Again, she remembered fondly the Fasching or the Richtag, joyous festivities for all the members of the neighborhood (Nachtbarschaft).

On October 15, 1969, the Webers emigrated to Detroit, where they established a new existence. A few years after arriving in Detroit, on January 14, 1974, Hans Weber, passed away. Again, a new chapter started in Regina's life. Still fresh in a new country, barely able to speak English, worrying about children in school, and without a husband to talk to, she carried on in the Saxon tradition: "Arbeit macht das Leben suess ..." This sweet life has now ended. However, Regina lives on, through her children and grandchildren.

The surprising reason aging eyes need bright sunlight

It's a well-known fact that aging eyes need brighter light to read. Now it turns out that bright indoor light, or better yet, bright sunlight, helps the body regulate all kinds of internal mechanisms influencing overall health. Older adults' eyes have a role in things as seemingly-unrelated to them as memory and depression, reports The New York Times.

As we get older, the eye sity discovered that the retina lens yellows and the pupil nar-

rows. Less sunlight reaches key cells in the retina that regulate the circadian rhythm system, the internal clock that prompts starting up in the morning and winding down at night.

A team at Brown Univer-

contains photoreceptor cells

that communicate directly with the brain, and these are especially receptive to blue light on the light spectrum.

But blue light is filtered by the aging eye. By age

45, adults receive only half the light needed to fully stimulate the circadian rhythm system. By 55, you're down to getting only 37 percent of the blue light, and by age 75, you get only 17 percent. Researchers recommend purposeful exposure to bright sunlight to counter these effects.

If you are contemplating cataract surgery, it's important that the replacement lens doesn't block blue light, as one third of them do.





DIE DEUTSCHE SEITE

Warum Schirkanyen und die Schirkanyer zum Burzenland gehören

2011 gedachten die Burzenländer Sachsen des 800-jährigen Jubiläums seit der ersten bekannten urkundlichen Erwähnung des Burzenlandes von 1211. Viele Gedenkfeiern fanden in Deutschland wie auch in Siebenbürgen statt. In diesem Jubiläumsjahr kam bei einigen Nicht-Burzenländern die Frage auf, ob Schirkanyen und die Schirkanyer überhaupt zum Burzenland gehören würden. Dies bewog den Verfasser, diesen Text zu schreiben, um die Dazugehörigkeit zu bestätigen.

Beginnen wir mit der uns am frühesten schriftlich überlieferten Geschichte und hören wir, was sie uns über das Burzenland im Jahre 1211 berichtet: "[...] Die erste Grenze dieses Landes aber beginnt bei den Verhauen der Burg Halmagen und geht bis zu den Verhauen der Burg Galt; von dort läuft sie bis zu den Verhauen des Nikolaus, wo ein Gewässer namens Alt herabgeflossen kommt, und so aufwärts am Alt entlang bis zur Einmündung der Tatrang in den Alt; und weiter geht sie bis zur Quelle der Tatrang und von da zur Quelle eines Baches namens Tömös und weiter bis zum Ausfluß eines Baches namens Burzen; dann wendet sie sich, so wie die Schneeberge das Land erfassen, bis nach Halmagen. Dieses ganze Land aber, so wie die genannten Berge und Flüsse es begrenzen, wird Burzenland genannt [...]" So lautet die deutsche Übersetzung des lateinischen Originaltextes der Verleihungsurkunde von König Andreas II. an den Deutschen Orden von 1211. Hier handelt es sich um die älteste Beschreibung des Gebietes des Burzenlandes, das der Deutsche Orden 1211 vom damaligen ungarischen König im südöstlichsten Zipfel Ungarns, in Siebenbürgen, geschenkt bekommen hatte.

Zu den geographisch sich in der Burzenländer Senke und auch an ihren Rändern befindenden Burzenländer Gemeinden gehört auch die sächsische Gemeinde Schirkanyen. Sie liegt im nordwestlichen Zipfel des einstigen Ordensgebietes, jenseits des Zeidner- und Geisterwaldes, einer Gegend, die bis zum Alt reichte. Schirkanyen lag also innerhalb dieser Grenze auf dem Gebiet des Deutschen Ordens. Es war die einzige sächsische Gemeinde dieses Gebietes, die aufrecht erhalten blieb, trotz aller Stürme vergangener Jahrhunderte und ohne eine bei Gefahr Schutz bietende Kirchenburg besessen zu haben wie die anderen sächsischen Gemeinden. Die deutschen Bewohner konnten ihre Identität und Eigenart bewahren.

In einer Papsturkunde Gre-

gors IX. von 1235 werden

folgende Pfarrer und Dörfer

der Terra Borza (Burzenland)

erwähnt: Leo de Dubucha

(deutsch Datk, rumänisch

Dopca), Gotfridus de Aqua calida (deutsch Warmbach, ungarisch Heviz, rumänisch Hoghiz), Nicolaus de Cormosbach (Cuciulata oder Wüstung), Conradus de Venetiis (deutsch Venetzie, rumänisch Venetia), Bernardus de Debran (nun Wüstung "Doberontch" in Schirkanyen), Hermannus et Gerlacus de Sarcam (Schirkanyen). Es sind die deutschen Siedlungen, westlich des Zeidner- und Geisterwaldes und bilden den nord- und nordwestlichen Teil des Burzenlandes. Auch die Namen der Geistlichen, wie Gottfried, Conrad, Bernhard, Hermann und Gerlach verraten uns die deutsche Besiedlung dieser Ortschaften. Diese Geistlichen protestieren gegen die Übergriffe des siebenbürgischen Bischofs und weisen auf die Zugehörigkeit zum Graner (heute ungarisch Esztergom) Erzbischof, d.h. zum Burzenländer Dekanat hin, wo sie zu einem gesonderten Verband zusammengeschlossen waren. Auch später, im Jahre 1372, als diese Orte zum Fogarascher Lehen gehörten, bilden sie eine Sondergruppe. Die gleichen Ortschaften bilden in diesem Jahr den kirchlichen Verband von 1235. Innerhalb dieser Gruppe hat sich allerdings die Rechtsstellung der einzelnen Dörfer verschoben. Schirkanyen erscheint nun als forum Scherkkengen situm in terra Fugaras prope Alt cum suis pertinentias, also als Markt, und die übrigen vier Dörfer sind bloß seine pertinentia, sein Zubehör. Dies beweist, dass Schirkanven nicht nur kirchlich, sondern auch politisch mit diesen Dörfern zusammengehörte, und es hatte eine Vormachtrolle unter den andern zugehörigen Dörfern

eingenommen.

Das erste Jahrhundert seit der Ansiedlung ist gekennzeichnet durch den Mongolensturm von 1241. Die Dörfer des Burzenlandes werden niedergebrannt, Menschen erschlagen und verschleppt. Einige dieser erst neu gegründeten deutschen Siedlungen sind damals ganz verschwunden. Mit Schirkanyen, als einzig überlebendem deutsches Dorf, waren sie zusammen ein zusammenhängendes geographisches Überbleibsel des nördlichen und nordwestlichen Teils des ehemaligen Ordensgebietes, also des Burzenlandes. Schirkanyen und die anderen einstigen deutschen Siedlungen können auf jeden Fall als ein Vorwerk der großzügigen deutschen Besiedlung dieser frühen Zeit gesehen werden.

Kirchlich wurden alle Burzenländer Gemeinden zu einem,,Kapitel"(Dekanat)zusammengeschlossen, an dessen Spitze der Dechant stand. Alle Burzenländer Gemeinden gehörten also kirchlich zum Kronstädter Kapitel, so auch Schirkanyen. Die ehemals untertänige Gemeinde war der Stadt Kronstadt verpfändet und gehörte zu ihrer Herrschaft (Domenium). Die Stadt übte in gewisser Beziehung das Kirchenpatronat aus und nahm die Verpflichtungen des Patronats auf sich. Dies beweist vor allem, dass die nach Schirkanyen berufenen evangelischen Pfarrer, von der Reformationszeit im 16. Jahrhundert angefangen bis zum Jahre 1893 alle aus Kronstadt stammten. Einer davon aus einer Burzenländer Gemeinde und zwei waren aus ihrem Heimatort Schirkanyen, also alle Burzenländer. Über die Jahrhunderte hindurch waren sie die geistlichen und geistigen Oberhäupter der Gemeinde.

Das Schirkanyer Kirchensiegel: "SIGIL. PARORCH. ECCL. SARKANY C. A. CAP. BARC. DISTR." (Kirchensiegel der Kirchengemeinde Schirkanyen, Augsburger Konfession, Burzenländer Kapitel), ein Metallsiegel mit zwei zueinander gerichteten Schlangen, die ihre beiden Köpfe am Rande des runden Siegels am oberen Teil des Siegels zueinander führen und aufeinander treffen. Es ist vielleicht das älteste metallene Erbstück der Kirchengemeinde nach dem vorreformatorischen Kelch aus dem 15. Jahrhundert. Daraus ist auch ersichtlich, dass Schirkanyen kirchlich zum Burzenländer Kapitel gehörte und heute

noch gehört. Es gehörte zum Inventar des Amtszimmers des Schirkanyer Pfarrhauses.

Burzenländisch – die gemeinsame Provinzialmundart

Die Schirkanyer gehören auch sprachlich zur Burzenländer Sprachgemeinschaft, der "Tspeinentspinzich schpuerz geschprantchelt Schpengy". Das Burzenländische sp, tsp steht für das restlichübliche Siebenbürgische sw und zw. Tspeinenspinzich steht für zwinenzwinzich (zweiundzwanzig), schpuerz für schworz (schwarz), geschpranchelt (gesprenkelt, gefleckte) und Schpengy für Schweny (Schweine). Dieses sprachliche Sonder-Kulturgut der Burzenländer, zusammen mit vielen anderen gemeinsamen Begriffen, die sich vom restlichen Siebenbürgen unterschieden, kann als Zeichen einer direkten Ansiedlung im Burzenland angesehen werden.

Auch im Brauchtum und im Vereinswesen sind die Burzenländer in der Vergangenheit eine kulturelle Einheit gewesen und es auch bis in die Gegenwart geblieben. Schirkanyer treten in ihrer Frauen-und Männertracht (die identisch ist mit dem restlichen Burzenland) bei Burzenländer Trachtenfesten auf, sind bei Burzenländer Bläser- und Mundarttreffen stets dabei und pflegen gern gemeinsam ihre Geschichte. Seit Jahren geben sie auch gemeinsam einen Burzenländer Wandkalender

heraus. In der 1983 gegründeten Heimatortsgemeinschaft der Burzenländer Gemeinden ist die der Schirkanyer von Anfang an dabei.

Bei den jährlichen Trachtenumzügen in Dinkelsbühl werden die Schirkanyer, die in der Volkstracht aufmarschieren, von der Empfangstribüne vor der Schranne meist als "das Tor zum Burzenland" begrüßt. In Siebenbürgen wurden sie von den anderen Burzenländer sächsischen Nachbarn als zugehörig betrachtet. Von den Altländern wurden sie, wie alle anderen Burzenländer Sachen, nach ihrem Burzen-Fluss, der ihr Gebiet durchfließt und ihm den Namen Burzenland gab, leicht ironisch "Burduzen" genannt. Die Lieder, die das Burzenland und ihre Bewohner besingen, werden auch weiterhin zu unterschiedlichen fröhlichen Anlässen von den Schirkanyern gesungen.

Zusammenfassend kann gesagt werden, dass die vielen historischen Gegebenheiten und die heutigen noch eindeutig vorhandenen kulturellen Merkmale beweisen, dass Schirkanyen eine Burzenländer Gemeinde ist und die Schirkanyer sich zum Burzenland bekennen und demnach auch Burzenländer sind. Die Frage der Zugehörigkeit der Schirkanyer und des Dorfes Schirkanyen zum Burzenland ist somit eindeutig geklärt.

Though they will be saving less, or nothing at all, their retirement investments will still be growing.


Another factor: switching to fewer hours could mean they will be willing to work for more years than they would with their present schedule.

Happy Mother's Day!

Mother's Day is a celebration honoring mothers and celebrating motherhood, maternal bonds and the influence of mothers in society. It is celebrated on various days in many parts of the world, yet most commonly in March, April, or May. It complements Father's Day, the celebration honoring fathers.

Celebrations of mothers and motherhood occur throughout the world; many of these can be traced back to ancient festivals, like the Greek cult to Cybele, the Roman festival of Hilaria or the Christian Mothering Sunday celebration.

The United States celebrates Mother's Day on the second Sunday in May. Julia Ward Howe first issued her Mother's Day Proclamation in 1870 as a call for women to join in support of disarmament. In the 1880s and further attempts to establish an American Mother's Day, but these did not succeed beyond the local level.The current holiday was created by Anna Jarvis in Grafton, West Virginia, in 1908 as a day to honor one's mother. Jarvis wanted to accomplish her mother's dream of making a celebration for all mothers, although the idea did not take off until she enlisted the ser-



vices of wealthy Philadelphia merchant John Wanamaker.She kept promoting the holiday until President Woodrow Wilson made it an official national holiday in 1914. The holiday eventually became so highly commercialized that many, including its founder, Anna Jarvis, considered it a "Hallmark holiday", i.e. one with an overwhelming commercial purpose. Jarvis eventually ended up opposing the holiday she had helped to create. She died in 1948, regretting what had become of her holiday. In the United States, Mother's 1890s there were several Day remains one of the biggest days for sales of flowers, greeting cards, and the like; it is also the biggest holiday for longdistance telephone calls. Moreover, churchgoing is also popular, yielding the highest church attendance after Christmas Eve and Easter.Many worshipers celebrate the day with carnations, colored if the mother is living and white if she is deceased.
