

'Governor Biker' offers some advice on wheels

Indiana Governor Mitch Daniels loves to travel the Hoosier state on two wheels - the ones attached to his Harley.

Quoted on www.in.gov, Daniels says, "Since becoming governor, I've had lots of fun riding and meeting people. I've found that I can ride on official business and people don't seem to mind. I'm always cautious or concerned that maybe somebody would find it inappropriate, but that hasn't happened yet. People seem to enjoy it and think it's maybe a little bit of fun. "

Recently, Daniels told Businessweek his secrets of buying a great bike.

Nine tips for buying a bike

- 1. Unless you're planning off-road riding, there's no reason for a motocross model, however cool you think you'd look.
- 2. Shop around. Prices can vary widely, and a lot of bikes are sold these days under distress.
- 3. Leave the checkbook at home, at least on the first trip. You are likely to become intoxicated by one bike, and you should give your head time to clear.
- 4. Leave your wife at home. She is unlikely to appreciate the necessity of this purchase.
- 5. Refrain from drinking for 12 hours before the shopping trip. You'll need all your resistance. (The danger here isn't a persuasive salesman; it's you.)
- 6. Ask the seller about condition, mileage, service history, and how the bike has been stored. Then ignore the answers and have a trusted mechanic check it out, including a run of the vehicle identification number (VIN) to ensure you aren't buying it just to restore it to its rightful owner.
- 7. Check the fit. Do your arms and hands easily reach the clutch and brakes? Your feet should be flat on the ground. Favor comfort over cool.
 - 8. Ask for a test ride.
- 9. Line up a buddy's garage in case you need to hide your purchase from your wife while gathering your courage. This is the point at which drinking is recommended.

Are they lonely? Forgetful? Or in trouble: What to do

To employed caregivers, an anxious call from their loved one at home is a dilemma.

Many loved ones who need certain amount of care are ca- to hold a blanket. pable of staying by themselves during the workday, but they are supposed to call you in an emergency.

And they certainly do call you when you're at work. What

At that point you need to decide if it is a real emergency. Are they injured, sick, or just lonely? Paula Spencer of Caring.com advises caregivers to have backup people, a neighbor or relative, who can do a physical check. Even a paid home nurse can help. A quick check may cost \$25 or more, but it can save lost work time.

If you think the problem

is loneliness or boredom find ways to help the person selfcalm. Some people can be encouraged to pet a dog or cat or

Heating pads comfort many people, even if they don't have pain. Be sure it has an automatic turn-off system.

If your charge is calling over and over to ask a basic question, such as "What time are you coming home?" the problem could be increasing dementia. An elder companion or respite program can break up the hours and provide a watchful eye.

If your loved one frequently calls with reports of burglars and break-ins, the problem may be anxiety. A medication may be advised by his or her doctor.

The Transportation Security Administration is testing a new system at Washington Dulles International Airport, George Bush Intercontinental Airport in Houston. It checks identification and boarding passes by machine rather than in person by officers.

The test will last several months and gauge how fast passengers move through the line and how accurate the machines are. TSA hopes they will do a better job of weeding out fraudulent documents and getting passengers to their planes, reports to USA Today.

If a fraudulent document is found, the passenger is referred to law-enforcement officials.

Social gossip has its benefits

A new study from the University of California, Berkeley, finds that the some kinds of gossip can have positive effects, such as helping to reduce bad behavior, prevent abuse and lower stress.

"Gossip gets a bad rap, but we're finding evidence that it plays a critical role in the maintenance of social order," said social psychologist Robb Willer, a co-author of the study.

Researchers discovered that gossip can be a therapeutic emotional outlet as it serves as a vehicle to relieve stress.

"Spreading information about the person whom they had seen behave badly tended to make people feel better, quieting the frustration that drove their gossip," Willer said. Apparently the tendency to want to warn others about unsavory characters is an ingrained tendency.

The study focused on social gossip rather than the misbehavior of movie stars and pubic figures.

Number of 'quiet' train cars increases

No noise, no talking, no ringing cellphones: those are some of the rules on "quiet cars." They operate on some of the busiest commuter routes run by Amtrak and other carriers in Chicago, New York and Southern California.

Quiet cars were introduced at the request of commuters who were trying to work in spite of noisy phones, chirping video games and passenger chatter.

OUR FAVORITE RECIPES

Here's a recipe you might want to try especially since there are so many fresh vegetables available this time of year. The foundation of the recipe is onions, peppers and tomatoes. You can use these three ingredients alone or add any assortment of vegetables to this.

Giwetsch or Vegetable Stew

1 cup diced onion

1 large garlic clove, chopped

1 medium white skinned potato, peeled and cut in 1 inch pieces (1 ½ cups)

1 bay leaf

2 medium carrots cut in 1-inch pieces (1 cup)

1 medium celery stock cut in 1-inch slices (3/4 cup)

1 medium zucchini cut in 1-inch pieces (1 cup)

½ medium cauliflower cut in large florets (about 12-13 florets or 1 ¼ lb)

1/4 cup coarsely chopped flat leaf parsley

4 oz. fresh green beans, trimmed

2 medium any other vegetable if available – coarsely chopped

(2 cups) peppers/tomatoes etc.

1-cup broth

1 tsp paprika

½ tsp dried oregano

Freshly ground black pepper to taste

In large Dutch oven, layer vegetables and seasonings in the following order: onion, garlic, white potato, bay leaf, carrots, celery, cauliflower, parsley, green beans and other veggies you have chosen.

Dissolve paprika in broth, stir in oregano and pour over vegetables. Cover and bring liquid to boil over mediumhigh heat. Reduce heat and simmer until vegetables are tender, about 30 minutes. Season with seasoned salt and pepper, if desired. Cool at least 20 minutes before serving. Makes 8 servings.

Giovinella Gonthier and Kevin Mor-







Yield-hungry investors turn to 'death puts'

A little-known strategy called a 'death put' can help you lock in higher returns for now without stiffing your heirs.

With interest rates stuck at rock-bottom levels, retirees and soon-to-be retirees are hungry for better returns on their low-risk investments.

The best places to look for yield and safety, advisers say, are long-term, high-grade bonds and certificates of deposit, but long-term holdings pose a problem for investors who are looking both to generate income and still leave something behind for their heirs.

Many economists expect interest rates to start rising and bond prices to start falling in the next few years. By locking up money for the long term, seniors could end up sticking their heirs with investments that fall in value or no longer keep pace with inflation.

A growing number of financial advisers are pointing to a little-known strategy that can help solve this problem: "death puts." They are available on some corporate bonds as well as most CDs sold through brokerages.

Death puts guarantee that when the owner of the bond or CD dies, the heirs can redeem it at face value, meaning they get back all the money that originally was invested.

In the meantime, buyers collect yields significantly higher than they can get on shorter-term investments. Atypical investment-grade 10-year corporate bond currently yields about 3.5 percent, roughly double the yield of a similar five-year bond.

A 10-year CD yields about 2.85 percent, more than a percentage point better than a five-year CD.

Several years ago, one 75-year-old retiree in Sun City Center, Fla., invested \$50,000 in Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corp. bonds with death puts, which pay 5.35 percent annually.

Most of the issuers of bonds with death puts are financial-services companies, such as Bank of America, Barclays Bank and Principal Financial.



An important new study shows that any physical activity, not just exercising, is linked to a reduced risk of developing Alzheimer's dis-

The finding should be considered by people in middle age, since the disease develops for years before any symptoms occur. Protective activities included washing dishes, cooking, cleaning, gardening and even playing cards.

Study subjects had no signs of dementia at the start of the ongoing Memory and Aging Project at Rush University Medical Center in Chicago.
