

'Personalized' cancer treatment is promising

There is a growing conviction among researchers that the secret to treating tumors lies not in the part of the body they occur, but in genetic glitches that drive tumor growth.

The new strategy is to match the mutation in any part of the body with a drug that targets the underlying gene mutation, such as Pfizer's Xalkori, which is used in adults with lung cancer.

Xalkori is now showing promise against childhood cancers. All children who were cured with Xalkori had defects in a gene known as ALK, the same gene that Xalkori targets in adult lung cancer.

The drug eradicated cancer in eight out of 10 kids with lymphoma and two children with deadly neuroblastoma.

Though these numbers are small, they are a milestone in cancer treatment.



The History of Kites


Although the exact date and origin of kites is unknown, it is believed that they were flown two thousand years ago in China. The first known recording of a kite in flight was a military maneuver from 200 B.C. Chinese General Han Hsin flew a kite over the walls of a city he was preparing to attack. From the length of the line, he determined how far to tunnel under the walls to get into the city. Their surprise attack gave the army the victory.

Kites eventually began to take on a cultural significance. They were used to dispel evil spirits, to bring good luck, and to send offering to the gods, but eventually, they were used for other purposes, including as vehicles, scientific research tools, and, of course, for recreation. Benjamin Franklin, Alexander Graham Bell, and the Wright brothers all used kites to study the wind and weather. In 1822, a school teacher named George Pocock used two kites to pull a carriage, sometimes up to 100 miles per hour. Kites were used in World War I, but were soon replaced by airplanes. In World War II, kites were used again as recovery beacons and target practice.

Today, kites are mainly used for recreation. They are made from new materials such as nylon, fiberglass, and carbon graphite. In 1972, the toy dual-line kite was introduced, and a sport was born. New developments in the sport include kite sledding and the newest high-speed sport, kite surfing. If it has been awhile since you've tried a kite out, take time to enjoy the improvements of kites and the fun of kite flying.

Transylvanian Saxon History for Kids in English

A fable of the 800-year history of the Transylvanian Saxons is now available in English for Omas, Opas, and parents in Canada and the USA to enjoy with their children and grandchildren. "The Ant People" is a translation of the book



"Das Ameisenvolk" by Anne Junesch of Hermannstadt in Transylvania. Because Transylvanian Saxons are known for their diligence, their perseverance, and their solidarity, the author and the illustrator, Elke Maria Klein, have depicted them as ants.

Agnes Sebastian, who is of Transylvanian Saxon heritage, has been an elementary teacher in the schools of the Waterloo

Region District School Board in Ontario for 32 years. In her review of this translation she writes:

The Ant People is an allegorical story of how the Saxon people got from Europe to present day Romania, related in a child's voice. It blends both historical and fanciful ideas in an easy to read and understandable tale for 8 to 11 year olds. ... The illustrations by the author's daughter, Elke-Marie Klein, are a great blend of historical accuracy also. She displays the unique fortress churches, and the colorful houses using the soft pallet of watercolors.

The story traces how the industrious ants found a new home amid the Carpathian Mountains, and developed strategies to survive by working in unison. They met numerous challenges by being innovative but were finally overcome by the effects of two world wars, which caused many of them to return to the West, into areas that had some commonalities in language and culture.

It is an enjoyable book with subtle underlying jokes, but with a good understanding of the real story of the Transylvanian-Saxons.

When Mrs. Junesch's lively tales on themes of Saxon life and culture came to the attention of Judy Penteker of Waterloo, Ontario, she contacted the author and proposed a translation. When it was presented to the Kindergruppe of the Transylvania Club in Kitchener, the children were fascinated by the story and pictures.

"Other than 'How I Became an American' written by Karin Gundisch of Heltau, and translated by James Skofield, about a Saxon family in Ohio, there is not much about this rich heritage available for our youngest Saxons whose first language is English." says Judy. She hopes "The Ant People" will give Saxon kids access to the wonderful story behind all the great food, the beautiful needlework and the traditions that are passed down in their families.

OUR FAVORITE RECIPES

It's that time of year again - plentiful fruits such as cherries, peaches and plums. What to do with them all? A good Saxon Hausfrau makes HUNKLICH!

PASTRIES - SAXON PIE (Hunklich)

As the Italians have their Pizza, so do the Saxons have their Hunklich, in some parts of Transylvania, called Hanklich. Like Pizza, Hunklich cannot be translated. Saxon Pie, or Hunklich, is an open faced cream custard pie usually with fruit added, using an enriched raised dough crust. It is baked in a baking pan measuring about 11 x 17 inches, 1 inch or more deep. The raised dough for the crust may be as simple as bread dough, or as rich as desired, depending on taste and available ingredients. The proportions of eggs, butter and sugar to the flour, therefore are varied. The cream custard for the filling consists of sour cream, eggs and sugar. Many Saxon cooks insist on using good heavy sour cream direct from the farm. Many use commercial sour creams with good results. The number of eggs used varies with cooks. Some use as few as 2 eggs for one Hunklich, others use many more. The more you use, the better the filling.

We have received many recipes for Hunklich, but since they are just variations of the same ingredients, we will not attempt to give them all in detail. The ones given will be sufficient to give you a good taste of this delicacy. Taste or necessity may inspire you to experiment and develop your own recipe.

SAXON PIE CRUST (Dough for Hunklich)

7 c. sifted flour

2 cakes yeast (or 1 large cake)

2 c. lukewarm milk

4 eggs slightly beaten

3/8 lb. butter, melted

1/2 c. sugar 1 Tbsp. salt

Dissolve yeast in 1/4 cup lukewarm milk, adding a little of the sugar. Let rise for about 5 minutes. Pour rest of lukewarm milk into a large mixing bowl or pan. Add eggs, butter, sugar, salt and the yeast. Mix well. Add flour and mix to a soft dough.

Knead and beat air into dough until bubbles are formed. Cover. Let rise until double in bulk. Punch down and again let rise until double in bulk. Roll on floured board to 1/4 inch thickness to fit about an 11x17 inch baking pan. Place dough into greased pan. Let rise for about 15 minutes. Cover dough with a filling and bake as directed.

This is enough dough for 2 Hunklichs or 1 Hunklich and 1 Nut Roll.

CHERRY SAXON PIE (Kirschen Hunklich)

1 qt. fresh sour cherries (less if canned)

1 pt. heavy sour cream

5 eggs, separated

1/2c. sugar

Combine and mix well, sour cream, egg yolks and sugar, in mixing bowl. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Spread sour cherries evenly on raised dough in pan. Pour cream-egg mixture over all. Bake in moderate 350° oven until golden brown, about 1/2 hour.

Note: Sweet cherries may also be used.

APPLE SAXON PIE (Apfel Hunklich)

Substitute apple slices for sour cherries in above recipe.

PLUM SAXON PIE (Pelsen Hunklich)

Substitute plums (cut into halves) for sour cherries in above recipe.

Siebenbürger Sachsen feiern stimmungsvollen Heimattag in Salem, Ohio (USA)

Salem, ein Ort mit 12 000 Einwohnern in Ohio, wurde 1806 gegründet. Der Name leitet sich von "Shalom" und "Solaan" ab und bedeutet "Frieden". Welch ein wunderbarer Name für einen Ort des Treffens der Siebenbürger Sachsen, von denen viele durch die Folgen eines schrecklichen Krieges ihrer Heimat beraubt wurden und dort in weiter Ferne ihren Lebensmittelpunkt einrichteten. Die Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons (ATS) und die Mitveranstalter Branches 18 und 19 und das ATS Kulturkomitee hatten zum 49. Heimattag der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Nordamerika vom 20. bis 22. Juli in Salem eingeladen und viele kamen, Jung und Alt, mit Bussen, eigenen PKWs oder mit dem Flugzeug angereist, um alte Bekannte und Freunde oder Verwandte wieder zu treffen oder neue Freundschaften zu schließen.

Die Begrüßung der bereits am Freitag ankommenden Teilnehmer im Salem Saxon Club war außerordentlich herzlich. Die Wiedersehensfreude war jedem ins Gesicht geschrieben und Worte der Freude schwirrten in verschiedenen Sprachen fröhlich durch die Luft: deutsch, englisch und natürlich auch siebenbürgisch-sächsisch. Es war selbstverständlich, dass Kinder kleine Jobs annahmen, um zum Familieneinkommen beizutragen.

Eine tiefe Dankbarkeit ist zu spüren, dass das Leben es letztendlich gut mit einem gemeint hat, und ein berechtigter Stolz liegt in dem Satz, der nicht direkt ausgesprochen wird: "Wir haben es geschafft - trotzdem!" Dieser Dankbarkeit dem eigenen Schicksal gegenüber gepaart mit der innigen Heimatverbundenheit zu Siebenbürgen und den Siebenbürger Sachsen ist es zuzuschreiben, dass die Spendenbereitschaft unserer in Amerika lebenden Landsleute groß ist. So konnte ATS-Präsident Thomas Manning der seitens des Verbandes der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Deutschland angereisten Stellvertretenden Bundesvorsitzenden Herta Daniel während der Kundgebung eine Spende für das Sozialwerk in der beeindruckenden Höhe von 18 000 US-Dollar überreichen.



That leads to better health. Studies show that when people have a higher sense of wellbeing, they have fewer hospitalizations and emergency room visits, miss fewer days at work and use less medication.

They are also more productive at work and more involved in the community.

Programs such as the University of Michigan's Women Breathe Free have had great results. As one participant said, she speaks with program

> counselors who "sounding boards" about her concerns. They helped her better understand her medications and how to take them. They helped her overcome fear and depression related to her asthma.


Next, you'll need to
