

The following changes have been proposed to the Constitution and By-Laws of the New Castle Eintracht Singing Society, ATS Branch 25 at the September 5, 2013 meeting.

Constitution and By-Law Changes September 5, 2013

Constitution

Article III Membership

Section 1.

Currently reads:

The Society consists of Active, Passive, Life and Honorary members.

Will be changed to read:

The Society consists of Active, Passive, and Life members.

Section 2.

Currently reads:

Only men of Saxon or German descent who possess a good character, who at the time of their initiation have passed the age of 21 years are eligible to join the society. All new members who join the Society as Active members January 1. 1985, under the age of 40, must have a certificate of insurance with the Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons. Germans or Saxons who are over 45 years of age when they enter this country, but not over 50 years of age may join as Active Members if they are eligible otherwise. Anyone who cancels his A.T.S. certificate will no longer be an active member of Branch 25. In addition to this, members must agree to support the preservation of the ethnic and cultural goals outlined in the Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons Constitution and By-Laws.

Only men of Saxon or German descent who possess a good character, who at the time of their initiation have passed the age of 21 years are eligible to join the society and be Active members of Branch 25 of the A.T.S.. All new members who join the Society as Active members as of January 1, 1985, and under the age of 40, must have a certificate of insurance with the Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons. Germans or Saxons who are over 45 years of age when they enter this country, but not over 50 years of age may join as Active Members if they are eligible otherwise. Anyone who cancels his A.T.S. certificate will no longer be an Active member of Branch 25. In addition to this, members must agree to support the preservation of the ethnic and cultural goals outlined in the Alliance of Transylvanian Saxons Constitution and By-Laws.

Section 3

Currently reads:

Only active members are entitled to vote and receive sick and death benefits, but all members have the right to join the Singing Section.

An active member, who joins the society and elects to become a passive member, must drop their membership from the society and rejoin as a passive member. Will be changed to read:

Only Active male members of Branch 25 of the A.T.S. are entitled to vote and receive sick and death benefits, but all male members have the right to join the Männerchor Singing Section.

An Active member, who joins the society and elects to become a passive member, must drop their membership from the society and rejoin as a passive member.

Section 4 Currently reads:

Passive members must have passed the age of 21 years, and are eligible to purchase an A.T.S. insurance or annuity certificate which would permit them to participate in all A.T.S. national events.

Will be changed to read:

Men or Women may become Passive members of the Eintracht Singing Society of Branch 25 of the A.T.S. and must have passed the age of 21 years, and are eligible to purchase an A.T.S. insurance or annuity certificate which would permit them to participate in all A.T.S. national events.

Section 5

Currently reads:

Honorary members are such who in the past have contributed to the growth of the community or the Society. These memberships may be renewed from year to year. They can only be elected by a two-thirds vote of the members present.

Section 5 will be deleted completely

By-Laws

Article 2 Currently reads: Singing Section Will be changed to read: Männerchor Singing Section

Section 1.

Every Active, Passive or Honorary member can join the Singing Section if passed by the Director as having a good voice and has been declared eligible by three-fourths (3/4) of all singers present.

Will be changed to read:

Every Active, and Passive male member can join the Männerchor Singing Section if passed by the Director as having a good voice and has been declared eligible by three-fourths (3/4) of all singers present.



Exercise at midlife pays off for decades later

In their 40s and 50s, people who made a point of staying fit before may get pretty busy. They start wondering if lifting weights, exercising at home or going to the gym is worth the time and effort.

There has always been some evidence that people who are fit at midlife are more likely to be healthy in their 60s, 70s and 80s. The best evidence available now comes from the Cooper Institute in Dallas. It has a database of patients who have gone to their preventive medicine clinic since 1970.

Chronic illnesses

Their study, published in the September Archives of Internal Medicine, focused on data from 18,000 healthy people whose cardiovascular fitness was measured by treadmill tests in their 40s or 50s. By examining Medicare claims on these subjects, researchers found that those who were most fit were much less likely to develop heart disease, Alzheimer's, diabetes, kidney disease, colon or lung cancer during the next 20 to 30 years.

Dementia

They also found that subjects who were fittest at midlife were one-third less likely to develop dementia in their 70s and 80s. Cardiovascular fitness helps prevent dementia by reducing the risk of diabetes and hypertension, both of which can contribute to dementia. But even after controlling these factors, the reduced risk for dementia and Alzheimer's disease remained.

Fitness now

Doctors at the University of California, Berkeley, say one benefit of being fit in middle age is that it increases the likelihood that you'll continue to exercise, eat well and stop smoking.

If you're past middle age and didn't exercise much back then, you can still get many of the benefits of midlife fitness if you start to exercise now.

It's never too late to start improving your fitness level with exercise and other healthy habits.

Start a Roth IRA now and send a child to college

Rules of investing in a Roth are simple. In 2013, you can contribute \$5,500 to a Roth IRA (or \$6,500 if lege costs. If you tap into the you're 50 or older).

Tap funds if you have to. After investing in a Roth, you should leave the money alone until you retire. But if you have to have money for any reason, you can withdraw the amount of who file jointly can contribyour contributions at anytime without paying taxes or penalties.

Earnings. When you withdraw earnings from your Roth before age 59 1/2, you'll pay taxes on what you've earned, along with a 10 percent penalty.

Buying a home. If you are a first-time home buyer and you've owned the Roth for at least five years, you can withdraw up to \$10,000 in earnings for the purchase

of a home without paying taxes or penalties.

Paying for children's col-Roth to pay a child's college costs, you will owe taxes on the earnings, but you won't have to pay the 10 percent early-withdrawal penalty.

In 2013, married couples ute the maximum to a Roth if their modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) is less than \$178,000. Those with MAGI of up to \$188,000 can contribute a reduced amount.

Single taxpayers with MAGI of \$112,000 can contribute the maximum, according to experts at MONEY magazine. Those who earn up to \$127,000 can contribute a reduced amount.

Der siebenbürgische Historiker Dr. Michael Kroner zeigt in seinem neuen Buch am Beispiel der Siebenbürger Sachsen, wie die Ost- und Südostdeutschen im Spannungsfeld zwischen ihrem urheimatlichen Mutterland und ihrem jeweiligen Vaterland jahrhundertelang gelebt und wie sie in bewundernswerter Weise ihr Deutschtum bewahrt haben.

Er hebt den festen Willen der Siebenbürger Sachsen hervor, in einem Land mit anderen Völkerschaften lebend, Deutsche zu bleiben ("Mer wällen bleiwen, wat mer senj"). Dazu verfügten sie über eine Reihe von identitätserhaltenden Einrichtungen. Die wichtigsten waren bis ins 19. Jahrhundert ihr privilegierter Stand als freie Bürger und Nation in dem bis 1876 selbstverwalteten "Sachsenland" und die Zünfte, in die nur Deutsche aufgenommen wurden, dann eine evangelischsächsische Volkskirche, ein allumfassendes, entwickeltes, deutsches Schulwesen, Nachbar-, Bruder-, Schwesterschaften und Vereine, die eine feste Volksgemeinschaft sicherten. Durch eine ununterbrochene Verbindung mit dem Mutterland konnten die Sachsen ferner die bei der Ansiedlung mitgebrachten abendländischen Lebensformen und Werte aufrechterhalten. Wandernde Handwerker und Kaufleute, vor allem hunderte von sächsischen Studenten, die an deutschen Universitäten studierten, sorgten dafür, dass diese deutsche Quelle nie versiegte.

Im 19. Jahrhundert entwickelte sich ein gesamtdeutsches Nationalbewusstsein, das auch die Auslandsdeutschen einschloss und diese durch Stiftungen und Vereine unterstützte.

Wie Dr. Kroner feststellt, waren die Siebenbürger Sachsen ihrem Vaterland gegenüber treue Bürger und lebten mit dessen Völkern meist friedlich nebeneinander, ohne sich zu vermischen oder assimilieren zu lassen. Ihre staatsbürgerliche Loyalität wurde von dem jeweiligen Vaterland belohnt, ihre deutsche Eigenart sei anerkannt und der Gebrauch der Muttersprache in eigenen Schulen erlaubt gewesen.

Zur Katastrophe führte jedoch die Tatsache, dass die Rumäniendeutschen in den 30er Jahren in den Sog des Nationalsozialismus gerieten und die wehrpflichtigen Männer im Zweiten Weltkrieg mit Zustimmung der rumänischen Regierung in die Waffen-SS und Wehrmacht einbezogen wurden. In dem nach dem 23. August 1944 kommunistisch gewordenen Rumänien wurden die Rumäniendeutschen als angebliche Faschisten und Kollaborateure Deutschlands



allerlei Repressalien, Verfolgungen, Deportationen und Enteignungen ausgesetzt. Das bewog den Großteil von ihnen, dem sozialistischen Regime den Rücken zu kehren und in ihr Mutterland, in die Bundesrepublik Deutschland, die nun gleichsam zum Vaterland wurde, auszusiedeln. Im Buch werden dem Leser die Bemühungen der Bundesrepublik um den Freikauf der Rumänendeutschen sowie um ihre Aufnahme und Eingliederung in Deutschland aufgezeigt. In Siebenbürgen leben zurzeit noch etwa 13000 Sachsen.

60 Jahre intensiv für die Gemeinschaft gearbeitet

Es gibt immer wieder Menschen in unserer Gemeinschaft, die durch ihren persönlichen Einsatz und ihr persönliches Engagement für die siebenbürgisch-sächsische Sache Besonderes leisten und so Ansporn und Vorbild für eben diese Gemeinschaft sind. Zu diesen herausragenden Persönlichkeiten zählt auch Dr. Fritz Frank, Ehrenobmann des Bundesverbandes der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Österreich, der am 15. September 90 Jahre alt wird.

Geboren wurde der Jubilar in Elektroschweißer), den er ab Klausenburg als zweites Kind des im Staatsdienst angestellten Gewerbeinspektors Dipl.-Ing. Rudolf Daniel Frank und seiner Ehefrau Frieda, geb. Scholtes. Die Eltern stammten aus Bistritz, mit eben dieser Stadt sich Dr. Fritz Frank zeitlebens in Erinnerung an die bei der Großmutter verbrachten Ferien mit dem Erlebnis der idyllischen Lebensform der sächsischen Bürgerfamilien verbunden fühlte.

Der im Elternhaus vermittelte

Familiensinn und die selbstverständliche sächsisch-evangelische Religiosität legten das Fundament für die Entwicklung des Heranwachsenden und für die Bewältigung der im Laufe des späteren Lebens auftretenden und zu meisternden Aufgaben. Mit lebensprägend war auch das Heranwachsen im mehrsprachigen und kulturell vielschichtigen Milieu seiner Geburtsstadt Klausenburg: Der Besuch der deutschen evangelischen Volksschule, dann der Wechsel in das rumänische "Liceul Gheorge Baritiu", nach dem "Wiener Schiedsspruch" 1940 der Wechsel in das ungarische "Reformierte Kollegium Apaczai Csere Janos" (Matura 1942) und das sich anschließende Studium der Rechts- und Staatswissenschaften (vier Semester, bis Juni 1944) an der Pazmany-Peter-Universität in Budapest waren der an Abwechslung und Erfahrung reiche Bildungsweg des jungen Fritz Frank. Formend war sicher auch die Erfahrung als Erzieher in ungarischen Adelsfamilien neben Schule und Studium in den Jahren 1941 bis 1944. Im Juni 1944 rückte er in Berlin als Soldat ein und nahm als Infanterist und Kriegsberichterstatter an den letzten schweren Kämpfen des Zweiten Weltkrieges im Südosten bei Budapest, Stuhlweißenburg und im Wiener Wald teil. Er wurde hierfür mit dem Kriegsverdienstorden 2. Klasse und dem Eisernen Kreuz 2. Klasse ausgezeichnet.

Fritz Frank erlebte das Kriegsende unversehrt, sein älterer Bruder dagegen war als Soldat der deutschen Wehrmacht schon im Dezember 1942 bei den Kämpfen am Don-Bogen gefallen. Die im September 1944 geflüchteten Eltern fand Fritz Frank im Mai 1945 in Oberösterreich, wo die Familie sich dann allmählich eine neue Existenz aufbaute. Fritz Frank erlernte in der für Flüchtlinge in Österreich schweren Zeit den Beruf eines Metallwerkers (Eisendreher und

1948 im Linzer Hüttenwerk VÖEST ausübte. Ab 1949 studierte er nebenbei in Graz an der Karl-Franzens-Universität Rechtswissenschaften und schloss das Studium 1955 mit der Promotion zum Doktor der Rechte ab. Im Unternehmen VÖEST erarbeitete er sich zunehmend verantwortungsvolle Positionen und absolvierte zahlreiche Auslandsaufenthalte, wobei er neben seinen fundierten Sprachkenntnissen in Rumänisch und Ungarisch auch sein Englisch und Französisch weiter entwickelte. Von 1970 bis 1983 war er Leiter des Konzernsekretariats der VÖEST-ALPINEAG, von welcher Position aus er 1983 als Abteilungsdirektor in den Ruhestand wechselte.

Fritz Frank trat aus der Erfahrung in seiner Zeit als Metallwerker und in sozialer Verantwortung als Akademiker schon 1953 dem Bund Sozialistischer Akademiker bei und 1967 der Sozialdemokratischen Partei Österreichs (SPÖ). Beruflich und sozial in das Leben in Österreich eingegliedert, war für die weitere Entwicklung des strebsamen Siebenbürger Sachsen ein erfolgreicher Verlauf vorgegeben. Im Juni 1953 heiratete er seine Frau Elfi, geb. Prokisch, die ihn von da an unterstützend, verständnisvoll und in schwierigen Lebensphasen treu zur Seite stand und steht. Das Ehepaar konnte heuer im Sommer,,diamantene" Hochzeit feiern! Der Ehe entstammen drei Kinder (Gertrud, Reinhard, Irmgard) mit drei Enkelkindern. Im Leben in Österreich wie auch im Beruf Fuß gefasst, widmete sich Dr. Fritz Frank bald auch dem in Österreich sich entwickelnden landsmannschaftlichen Leben der meist durch den Treck im Herbst 1944 nach Österreich gelangten Siebenbürger Sachsen. Sein Vater, als Beauftragter des Komitees der Altösterreichischen Heimatvertriebenen in Vorchdorf tätig, war wohl hierfür ein Vorbild, wobei auch die Erinnerung an die sächsischen Strukturen in der Heimat Bistritz und die Behauptungssituation in Klausenburg mitgewirkt haben mögen. Besonders aber die Geschlossenheit und Urkraft der sächsischen Bauern auch in der Fremde haben ihn beeindruckt. So widmete sich

Dr. Frank ab Mitte der 1950er Jahre der Mitarbeit bei der Pflege und Erhaltung der Kultur und des Brauchtums sowie der Jugendarbeit der Siebenbürger Sachsen zunächst in Oberösterreich, er war Pressereferent der Landsmannschaft in Oberösterreich und von November 1969 bis 1994 deren Landesobmann und bis 1988 gleichzeitig stellvertretender Bundesobmann der Landsmannschaft in Österreich. Schwerpunkte in diesen Funktionen waren die Ausrichtung der Kultur- und Brauchtumsarbeit, Eingliederung der Siebenbürger Sachsen in das Kulturleben und Sozialleben in Österreich und die Pflege der Auslandskontakte zu den Landsleuten in Siebenbürgen, in Deutschland und in Übersee, wobei ihm seine beruflichen und politischen Beziehungen oft hilfreich waren. Seit 1975 widmete er sich auch zunehmend der Organisation und Abwicklung von humanitären Hilfsaktionen für die Notleidenden in Siebenbürgen und der Beratung der Landsleute in Fragen der Ausreise, Eingliederung und bei sozialen Problemen. Von 1988 bis März 1998 war er in Nachfolge von Dr. Roland Böbel Bundesobmann der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Österreich und wer die Vielfalt der Aufgaben dieses Amtes kennt, weiß, dass dies ein Vollzeit-Job ist. Dr. Frank hat die Arbeit mit Umsicht, Einsatz und vollem Herzen gemeistert. Auch nach seinem Rückzug aus dem höchsten Amt des Bundesverbandes der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Österreich blieb Dr. Frank nicht untätig, sondern ist seinen Landsleuten und ihren Organisationen weiterhin mit Rat und Tat zur Seite gestanden, auch dann, als ihn persönliche und gesundheitliche Belastungen in der Familie behelligten.

Für sein langjähriges Wirken für seine Landsleute und für seinen Einsatz bei der Eingliederung der Siebenbürger Sachsen in das Leben in Österreich wurde der Jubilar mehrfach geehrt und ausgezeichnet. Er erhielt die "Goldene Medaille für Verdienste in der Republik Österreich" (1962), den Titel

Seinen Einsatz für die Gemeinschaft dankten ihm seine Landsleute mit mehreren ehrenvollen Ernennungen: 1966 Ernennung zum Ehrenmitglied der Siebenbürgischen Jugend von Traun, 1994 Ehrenmitgliedschaft des Vereins der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Wien, 2007 Ehrenmitgliedschaft der "Stiftung Saxonia" in Kronstadt, 2008 Ehrenobmann der Heimatortsgemeinschaft Bistritz/Nösen. Für seinen langjährigen erfolgreichen Einsatz als Landesobmann der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Oberösterreich wurde er zum "Ehrenobmann" des Landesverbandes Oberösterreich ernannt, für sein erfolgreiches Wirken an der Spitze des Bundesverbandes wurde ihm die Ehrung als "Ehrenobmann des Bundesverbandes der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Österreich" zuteil.

Wer Dr. Fritz Frank kennt und ihn bei seiner Arbeit erlebt und begleitet hat, der ist immer wieder angetan von der Selbstverständlichkeit seines Handelns, seiner konsequenten und engagierten Art, mit der er selbst schwierige Probleme zu lösen versucht, aber auch von der Herzlichkeit im Umgang mit seinen Partnern. Er verlangt von seinen Mitarbeitern und Mitstreitern oft viel, aber er ist immer bereit, selbst viel mehr zu leisten. Er war und ist ein Mann der Praxis mit der Vision des Machbaren, er wirkt als Vorbild in gleicher Weise im lokalen Bereich der Nachbarschaften, wie auf der höheren Ebene der Landesorganisationen und des Bundesverbandes. Er versteht es, auch nicht-siebenbürgische Partner, seien es Politiker, Wirtschaftler, Kulturschaffende oder eben einfach Menschen, die er, unter welchen Umständen auch immer er ihnen im Alltag begegnet, zu informieren und zu interessieren versteht, um sie damit für unsere Belange aufgeschlossener zu machen. Die zahlreichen Veröffentlichungen und Aufsätze in der Siebenbürgischen Zeitung und in anderen einschlägigen Printmedien, seine zahlreichen Reden, Ansprachen und öffentlichen Aussagen spiegeln den eifrigen und erfahrenen Einsatz dieses Mannes für seine Vision des Einigseins der Siebenbürger Sachsen auch bei verschiedenen Lebensbereichen wider, ebenso für die Pflege ihrer Kultur und des Brauchtums sowie des Verbundenseins im "heimischen Geist" unserer Gemeinschaft.

Er war als Stellvertretender Bundesobmann bei den Verhandlungen anlässlich des Konsultationsgespräches in Elixhausen-Sachsenheim, die zum Gründungsbeschluss der Föderation der Siebenbürger Sachsen am 1. Oktober 1983 führten, dabei, hat dann in Vertretung des Bundesobmannes der Landsmannschaft der Siebenbürger Sachsen in Österreich am 19. Juli 1984 auf dem Heimattag der Siebenbürger Sachsen von Nordamerika in Kitchener/Ontario/Kanada die Gründungsurkunde mit unterzeichnet und war auch dabei, als anlässlich des Heimattages in Kitchener (Ontario) in Kanada das Demokratische Forum der Deutschen in Siebenbürgen (DFDS) seinen Beitritt zur Föderation erklärte. Dr. Frank hatte schon nach der Wende in Rumänien im September 1991 eine Reise der Vertreter der damaligen Mitglieder der Föderation nach Siebenbürgen organisiert, in deren Verlauf auch intensive Gespräche mit den Vertretern des DFDS stattgefunden haben, die letztlich zum Beitritt des DFDS zur Föderation 1993 mit beigetragen

Für einen Menschen, der fast 60 Jahre intensiv für seine Gemeinschaft gearbeitet hat, in ihr gelebt hat und zeitweise in höchster Position dieser Gemeinschaft vorgestanden hat, ist es sicher eine Genugtuung, dass er "sein" Haus gut bestellt hat und die Verantwortung wohl vorbereitet in jüngere Hände gelegt hat. Mit dem Dank für diese Leistung gratulieren wir Dr. Fritz Frank herzlich zu seinem 90. Geburtstag und wünschen ihm, dass er im Kreise seiner Familie und mit Freunden eine schöne Geburtstagsfeier haben möge.
