PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As I write this column, I am sitting on the bus, traveling around Transylvania and Romania. Our 79 people arrived on Wednesday, July 31, relatively easily in Bucharest. We had one lost passenger and a few lost suitcases, but by the time we left the hotel in the morning, everyone and everything had arrived. Our first stop was the Romanian Parliament Building. What a beautiful place, with a very dark history. Nicolae Ceausescu started building the palace. He wanted to show off his power. The marble and wood, with very few exceptions, came from Romania. When the Revolution happened in 1989, the building was only half finished. There was a great debate about whether to tear it down or finish the construction. It was decided that it would be less money to just finish it. One of the ways that Ceausescu paid for the construction was by letting people, including our Transylvanian Saxon relatives, buy their way out of Romania. Families paid big amounts to get their relatives out of the country and into Germany, Austria, and North America. The Parliament building itself, is the largest in Romania, and most of the world. The only one bigger is the Pentagon building in the USA.

Next stop was Hermannstadt or Sibiu. We arrived late Thursday evening, due to the extra time it took to travel from Bucharest. The Romanian Minister of Transportation closed the four-lane highway between the two cities, which required every truck, car, and bus to travel the two-lane road with very few places to pass. Friday started with a walking tour from our two excellent tour guides for the trip. Bogdan and Alex are so knowledgeable, with lots of history and stories of all walks of life in the country.

Then, everyone was on their own for the entire weekend. I had some official duties to do. One was being part of the Federation awarding German rock star Peter Maffay the Gold Star of Honor. He was born in Transylvania and left when he was a teenager. He has done lots of charitable deeds back in his homeland. The Parade was Saturday morning. I was very proud to have some of our tour people march in the parade. I was proud to sit on the stage and watch, along with Federation officials, Romanian politicians, the female mayor of Hermannstadt, and President Klaus Johannis and his wife. For those that don't know, the President is Transylvanian Saxon. All the groups marching past were fantastic. The differences in the Trachts of the ladies are fascinating, as most of the villages had something a little different than the rest. For example,

Tax on Social Security benefits draws criticism and new proposals

If you have just begun retirement planning, you might be surprised to find that Social Security payments are taxed, a fact that has drawn criticism and a number of proposed fixes.

About 70 million people receive Social Security payments every month. About 40 percent of those beneficiaries pay taxes on their benefits.

The IRS formula for taxing benefits means (roughly) that if your income exceeds \$25,000 (filing individually) or \$32,000 (filing jointly), you have to pay federal taxes on some portion of your benefits. Generally, if Social Security is the only source of income, it probably will not be taxable, although 12 states collect their own taxes Social Security. About 40 percent of beneficiaries pay federal taxes on benefits.

One of the latest bills to address this issue was proposed in January 2024 with the “You Earned It, You Keep It Act,” introduced by Rep. Angie Craig (D-MN). This bill would eliminate federal taxes on benefits, which would increase income for some retirees, but would apply Social Security tax to more of the income earned by higher income working individuals, according to Money.com.

At least one analysis projects that the bill would keep Social Security solvent through 2054, decades longer than the projected collapse in 2031. However, as with other bills proposed by members of either party, passage of the bill is uncertain or downright unlikely, according to US News.

my grandparent's village of Gross Scheuern has a scarf that hangs from the side of the apron. Not all villages do that.

Following the parade, I had lunch with the dignitaries (minus the President), then off to Thalia Hall for speeches and presentations. During this time, there was a presentation about the Diploma Andreanum. I will explain more about this later. After that, my official duties were over. There were lots of exhibits and events to attend all over the "old town". Sunday, there was a church service in the Evangelical Church. I did not attend, however, because my relatives from Germany took my mother and my cousin to Gross Scheuern for services in the church of our grandparents. To have communion in the same church that our ancestors had taken communion and where they were baptized was a real treat. As it turned out, the Pastor at the Evangelical church, Klaus Untch, hurried from that church to our church for our noon service. A big shout-out to Udo Muller, head of the Transylvanian Saxons from Ingolstadt, Germany, who arranged the event in our village. Speaking with Udo and Pastor Untch topped off a very nice day.

The concerts in the Grosser Ring (Big Square) were great. Some Saxon boys played on Friday evening, Peter Maffay played on Sunday evening. Dance groups and brass bands rounded out the rest of the weekend.

Monday morning, we departed Hermannstadt and headed for the Carpathian Mountains and various Saxon villages and hometowns. I'll talk more about the rest of the trip next issue.

- Did you know that 2024 is the 800th anniversary of the Diploma Andreanum? This is the "Golden Charter" that was created in the year 1224 from King Andrew II from Hungary, who allowed the Transylvanian Saxons to govern or rule themselves. The original document was lost. However, a new document was written and signed by King Charles I Robert in 1317 when he re-wrote and re-approved the document. This copy was kept in the Archives of the Saxon Nation in Hermannstadt in the old town hall, and now in the Romanian/Sibiu State Archives. It was on display during the Sachsentreffen weekend.

Check the airbag

When buying a used car, check for any indication that the airbag has been removed. Thieves often make dents and dings in the interior plastics as they pry the air bags out.

Check the airbag indicator light on the dashboard. It should glow briefly when the car is first started, which is part of the car's diagnostic system. If the light never comes on or stays on continuously, the air bag probably isn't functioning.

If you still aren't sure if the airbags will perform as expected, have a trusted mechanic inspect the car for air bags. Body shops and dealers have a scanning tool to look at the system and see if there are any faults.

There will be a charge for the service -- but it could save your life.

Dry eyes need consumer awareness



Symptoms of dry eye can range from mildly irritating to almost debilitating. They include painful scratchiness, light sensitivity, and stinging.

About 25 percent of eye doctor visits are for dry eye-related complaints.

What causes all these dry eye problems?

- Age. Most patients are over 40.

- Soft contact lenses. They absorb fluid on the eye surface.

- Vision correction surgery. Dry eye can be a side effect of the 1.4 million eye surgeries done each year in the U.S.

- Eyelid surgery. Sometimes results in a sliver of an opening when eyes are closed, which dries the eyes.

- Activities in which the eyes are not blinked regularly, including computer use and watching television.

- Wind. Outside or from heating and cooling systems in the home and car.

- Dust or allergens in the air.

With a huge need for dry-eye treatments, many pharmaceutical companies offer a plethora of remedies, with more in the works. Right now, here's what's available:

Lubricating drops such as Systane, TheraTears, and Refresh.

Proclear and Acuvue Oasys, which are contact lenses meant to alleviate dry eyes for contacts wearers.

Omega-3 fatty acid (a nutritional supplement). A 2005 Harvard study showed the benefits of tuna for eye health.

Restasis, an FDA-approved prescription drug that has good results in many cases, but doesn't work for everyone.

Goggles: Those by Panoptx and others create a moisture chamber around the eye. They are available at ski shops and motorcycle shops.

Boston Scleral Lens. A custom-fitted prosthetic device that creates a reservoir over the cornea.

When King Andrew II of Hungary confirmed the rights of the German settlers of southern Transylvania in 1224 in a document later called the "Andreanum", the far-reaching autonomy defined in it was nothing unique for that time. It only became so through its consistent preservation and expansion over the centuries. On the basis of this document, which was confirmed many times until the 17th century, the Germans of Transylvania finally became the state-supporting state and were able to maintain their special legal status until 1876 – centuries of experience then enabled them to adopt modern forms of organization up to the present day. This long-lasting effect of a piece of parchment from 800 years ago is the subject of a trilingual – German, English and Romanian – travelling exhibition.

Managing finances when a loved one dies



The single most important thing you can leave to your heirs is a current list of passwords and access codes, according to Kiplinger.com.

Conventional advice is to involve both partners in financial decisions and management. But as a practical matter, one spouse usually handles these matters. The key is making it easy for a surviving spouse to take over.

First, make sure your spouse knows the password or access codes for your computer and phone. This gives them access to email and texts, which can help pay bills, identify and manage monetary accounts, and contact friends.

Make sure your spouse knows, at least roughly, where your money is saved and invested and what insurance policies you may

have. When a partner dies, survivors need immediate access to money for funeral arrangements and living expenses. Both spouses need to know who their financial advisor is and how to contact him or her.

For savings, checking, and investment accounts, make sure both partners own the accounts so the survivor can access them immediately.

Household details are also important. Couples should keep a running list of big-ticket items. Take a walk through the house with your spouse, make a list of important items like the water heater and furnace, and write down the approximate year they were installed. While you are at it, note the name of the company or professional you used for the job and, if you remember, how much you paid.

“We are not uprooted”

The 2. Big Sachsentreffen took place in Sibiu

For three days and three nights, the Transylvanian Saxons celebrated at the second Great Saxon Meeting in Sibiu and the whole city joined in. Around 20,000 people were delighted with the 89 events that took place under the motto “Home without Borders”. There was a lot of dancing, laughing, singing, tears of joy and emotion flowed and for many participants it will continue until mid-August, because the hometown communities have organized their meetings all over Transylvania.

To say it in advance: Everything went flawlessly, and all participants praised the organizers - with the Transylvanian Forum at the top.

The meeting was opened on Friday on the Great Square, where the first shouts of joy sounded and the first tears of emotion flowed for the reunion. At the Great Square, you could also exchange your first memories at the long tables, and there was food and drinks from morning to evening. Of course, the *mici* (Chevapcici) were one of the most popular dishes, with which a cold beer could not be missing. The participants already had something in common: the badge (our picture), which could be purchased in the Forum House together with the program for 80 lei. The badge was also the ticket for the many events that took place in the center of Sibiu.

In addition to the many events, small concerts took place on every corner, where the participants could spontaneously shake their legs. By the way, dancing legs: On Friday and Saturday evening, after the conclusion of the official program at the Großer Ring, it continued with at least two parties in Neppendorf.

Perhaps the most touching item on the agenda of the meeting took place on Saturday morning: the traditional costume parade. More than 2,000 people wearing traditional costumes started at the Kleiner Ring, greeted the guests of honour on the stage at the Großer Ring, and then continued through the Generalloch. The 82 groups came mainly from Germany, but of course there were also villages from Romania, Austria and Switzerland, even from the United States and Canada.

After the traditional costume parade, the greetings and the awarding of the Federation’s Star of Honour took place on the stage on the Great Square. 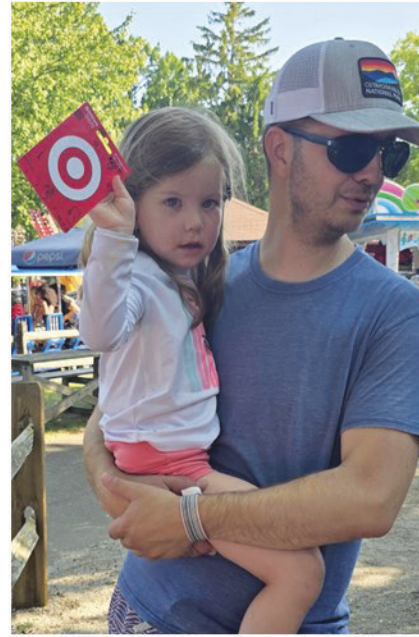
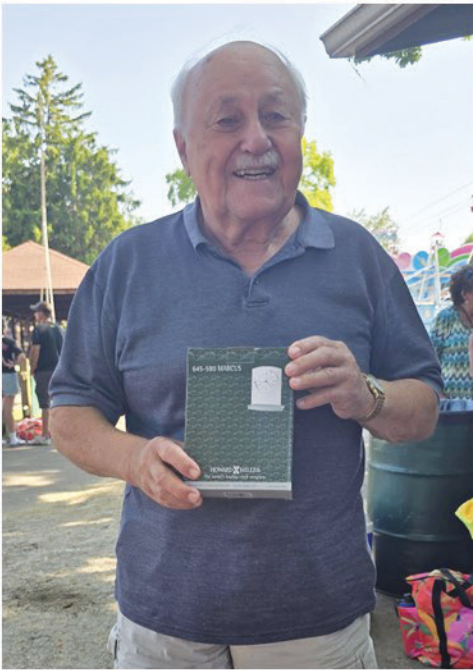
