PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I hope everyone is enjoying the holiday season. It's hard to believe that the year 2024 is almost over. I'm not sure where the time went. I swear, I was just traveling around Transylvania a month or two ago! The Home Office Staff, the ATS Board of Directors, and myself want to wish each and every one of you a wonderful Christmas, and a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year.

I had the pleasure of attending the Youngstown Saxon Club's Christmas party on Sunday, December 8th. Prior to the celebration, I attended Branch 30's monthly meeting and installed their Officers for the upcoming year 2025. Thank you for the invitation. It was a beautiful day.

With the beginning of the new year, the ATS scholarship season will begin. The next issue of the Volksblatt will have scholarship information included. Make sure to tell your college-age children and grandchildren to be on the lookout for the information.

Did you know that the first known Christmas card was sent in 1611? According to Wikipedia, the card was sent by Michael Maier to James I of England and his son, Henry Frederick, Prince of Wales. The card was discovered in 1979 in the Scottish Record Office. The card was hand-made and incorporated Rosicrucian imagery. (Rosicrucian was an early 17th century spiritual movement and usually symbolized by the Rose Cross or Rosy Cross.) The card included the words "A greeting on the birthday of the Sacred King, to the most worshipful and energetic lord and most eminent James, King of Great Britain and Ireland, and Defender of the true faith, with a gesture of joyful celebration of the Birthday of the Lord, in most joy and fortune, we enter in the new auspicious year 1612". The words were laid out to form a rose.

The first commercially available Christmas card was commissioned by Sir Henry Cole and designed by John Callcott Horsley in London in 1843. Cole was a very popular, but busy, man. Christmas and New Year's letters were popular in England at that time. He was having a hard time keeping up with the correspondence and it was considered rude not to answer mail. He came up with an idea. Horsley designed Cole's idea as an illustration showing a family at the table celebrating the holiday, flanked by images of people helping the poor. He had a thousand copies made by a London printer. At the top of each was the salutation "To: _ _," allowing Cole to personalize his responses. Each card had the generic greeting "A Merry Christmas and A Happy New Year To You". Along that timeframe, the "Penny Post" was developed in England. The Post Office was able to offer a Penny stamp for mail delivery, as new railways

More deadly heart attacks occur on **Christmas and New** Year's Day

Strange, but evidently true: Deadly heart attacks spike during the holidays.

According to a study published in Circulation, the journal of the American Heart Association, more cardiac deaths occur in the U.S. on December 25 than on any other day of the year, followed by December 26 and January 1.

But it is not just the U.S. One medical journal study found a 15 percent overall increase in heart attacks in Sweden during the winter holidays. Heart attacks spiked 37 percent on December 24 (Christmas Eve), most often affecting people over 75 and those with diabetes or previous cardiovascular disease.

And here is another ominous fact: More serious heart attacks occur on Mondays than any other day, according to the British Cardiovascular Society. This year Christmas Day (December 25) falls on a Monday.

So, why is this so? Doctors and researchers have their suspicions.

- People are busy. They ignore heart attack symptoms. Who wants to interrupt the party?
- People are traveling and may forget to take their medications.
- They are eating a lot of fatty, sweet foods. And this different diet may cause blood pressure to rise and heart rates to increase. Alcohol is probably also a factor.

were being built and helped with the delivery of the mail. Cards became very popular because they could be posted in an unsealed envelope for one halfpenny half the price of an ordinary letter.

The first Christmas cards usually had pictures of the Nativity scene on them. In late Victorian times, birds (robins) and snow-scenes became popular. Christmas cards appeared in the United States in the late 1840s but were extremely expensive and most people could not afford them. In 1875, Louis Prang, a printer originally from Germany who worked on Christmas cards in the UK, started mass producing cards at his print shop near Boston so more people could afford them. His first cards featured flowers, plants, and children, rather than a Christmas or holiday image. The card

read "Merry Christmas". Appreciation of the quality and artistry of the cards grew in the late 1800s, spurred in part by competitions organized by card publishers with cash prizes offered for the best designs. People soon collected Christmas cards like they would coins, and the new crop each season were reviewed in newspapers, like books and movies today.

The modern Christmas card industry began in 1915, when a Kansas City based fledgling postcard printing company started by teenager JC Hall published its first holiday card. JC was later joined by his two brothers. The Hall Brothers company adapted a new format for their cards - 4 inches wide, 6 inches high, folded once, and inserted in an envelope. This new format allowed people to write more than they could on a

postcard without having to write a whole letter. This new "book" format began with colorful cards with redsuited Santas and brilliant stars of Bethlehem, as well as cheerful clichéd messages. Card companies reached out for new ideas, and started commissioning famous artists to design new ones. Salvador Dali, Grandma Moses and Norman Rockwell were just a few who designed cards. The name of the Hall Brothers company was changed to Hallmark in 1928.

For some, sending Christmas cards in the mail is a lost tradition. Digital or social media greetings have taken the place of traditional Christmas cards, with approximately 500 million sent yearly. However, over two billion cards are still sent in the US each year. Merry Christmas everyone!

Radu Nebert new chairman of the Transylvanian Forum

Martin Bottesch, who has held the office of chairman of the Transylvanian Forum since 2013, did not stand for re-election at the representative meeting of the Democratic Forum of Germans in Transylvania (DFDS). Radu Nebert was elected as the new chairman and Andrea Rost as deputy chairman on 16 November in Sibiu. Winfried Ziegler, Managing Director of the Transylvanian Forum, and the new chairman Radu Nebert thanked Martin Bottesch for the many years of cooperation.

Transylvanian Forum is elected today and I am saying goodbye after eleven years in which I held the chairmanship, I would like to thank everyone for the friendly cooperation. We are united by the awareness that it is worthwhile to stand up for the German community in Romania, that the preservation of language and culture means at the same time the preservation of our identity. We are happy to work for this. I am retiring from the leadership because it is time for younger people to take responsibility, but I will remain committed to the work and goals of the forum," says Martin Bottesch.

In the political review of the agenda, the problem was pointed out that many members of the German minority believe that the minority automatically has a member of parliament: The Romanian Chamber of Deputies allocates 330 seats according to proportional representation. Minorities must also reach a certain number of votes to have a member of parliament. It is therefore important to go to the polls so that the MP of the German minority gets a strong mandate. Of the three upcoming elections, the parliamentary election on December 1 is the most important for the German minority, Bottesch stressed. The Forum is running with

"As a new board of the a list headed by former MP Ovidiu Ganţ. In the four-hour meeting in the Hall of Mirrors of the Sibiu Forum headquarters, the budget for 2025 was also discussed. The chairman and the representatives of the commissions presented their reports: Christiane Neubert (Fogarasch) reported on the work of the cultural commission, Stefan Gorczyca (Sighisoara) from the economic commission, Ilse Philippi (Sibiu) from the social commission and Verona Onofrei (Mühlbach) from the school commission. A debriefing on the Great Saxony Meeting 2024 was also on the agenda. Thomas Şindilariu, Undersecretary of State at the Department of Interethnic Relations (DRI), reported on his work. The membership fee, which is forwarded to the Transylvanian Forum and the National Forum via the local forums, has been set at 10 lei per year.

The assembly elected the heads of the four commissions: While Christiane Neubert (Culture), Stefan Gorczyca (Economics) and Verona Onofrei (Schools) applied again and were elected, Ilse Philippi did not stand for re-election after a longer term of office. Elisabeth Köber (Neppendorf) is now responsible for the chairmanship of the social commission.

A quirky take on the Christmas tree has deep roots in history

If you have a quirky sense of humor and a big house, or maybe a tiny house and no space, you might consider the latest and strangest Christmas trend: An upside down Christmas tree.

It's not really a modern innovation, but instead a copy of a tradition begun in the 7th century by the German St. Boniface. He supposedly used an upside down fir tree as a way to teach about the Trinity. By the 12th century, a tradition began in Poland to hang a conifer tree upside down and decorate it with paper, ribbons, apples, nuts and shiny things. So its origins are not rude -- just ancient.

Today, this idea seems puzzling but, believe it or not, there are a lot of choices in artificial upside-down Christmas trees. Artificial trees are the best to use for this odd purpose, since real ones take a lot more effort to flip upside down and hoist to the ceiling.

The idea is to apply garlands and lights to the artificial tree before hoisting it up to the ceiling, where it hangs tip down just a foot or so above the floor. Then more delicate bulbs and decorations are applied once the tree is up.

It takes up a lot less space on the floor, that's for sure. The space typically occupied by the widest branches is instead modestly filled by the tip of the tree and the floor space beneath can instead be filled with colorful gifts. That makes it ideal for a small space.

I have come to know and can now be sure that you have forgiven me. The Saviour was born for me too, it has become Christmas Day for me too. Now I can close my eyes in peace. I thank you for your great gift..."


