I read recently that February is Insurance Careers Month. The ATS is always in need of people wishing to become a Sales Deputy. We have quite a few Branches who do not have an assigned salesperson in their Branch, requiring their members to contact the Home Office for life insurance and annuity applications. If there is anyone out there who wishes to earn a little extra money and is willing to go through the process of becoming licensed in their state, please contact the Home Office. Most states require a Pre-Licensing class to be completed prior to taking the state's commercial license test. Once you've passed the test and sold a policy, the ATS will reimburse you for the cost of the class and test. You will then be required to take continuing education classes, of which the ATS will also reimburse you for. Our products are simple. We sell only whole life insurance and annuities. Our annuities do not require a Series license, just a Life Insurance license. So, whether you are retired and looking to earn some extra income or would just like an extra part-time job to supplement your earnings, this might be your answer.

January marked the 80th anniversary of the deportation of Romanian Germans/Transylvanian Saxons to the Soviet Union for forced labor. Have you started thinking about your income taxes yet? You may want to consider contributing to your ATS Traditional IRA or your ATS Roth IRA. You have until April 15, 2025, to deposit into your account for the year 2024. For last year, the maximum amount that you can contribute is \$7,000. However, if you are age 50 or over, you can do an additional \$1,000 for a total of \$8,000. If you cannot afford to deposit the entire amount allowable, you should still consider depositing something. Every little bit that you can put away now for your retirement will only help you in the future. Please remember, though, you must have earned income (generally wages or self-employed income) to make an IRA contribution. Don't have an ATS IRA account? It's not too late to create an account and contribute to it for last year.

Homeowners face cost dilemma

Homeowners who financed during the era of low interest rates are facing an expensive dilemma, according to The Wall Street Journal.

Their locked-in mortgage rates just over 3 percent made it possible to buy bigger houses but, while their mortgage rate isn't rising, other costs are.

In particular, the cost of insurance and property taxes have skyrocketed in some areas, making the homes they could once afford too expensive.

According to Intercontinental Exchange (ICE), in five metro areas, homeowners spend more than half of their monthly mortgage payments on taxes and insurance. Nationwide, for about 9 percent of homeowners, taxes and insurance add up to 50 percent of their monthly mortgage payment. At the end of 2014, taxes and insurance made up less than 4 percent.

In some cases, a homeowner who bought in 2015 could have paid their property taxes, home insurance and flood insurance for about \$725 per month. But that cost is now closer to \$2,500.

Meanwhile, home insurance premiums also jumped in price between 2022 and 2023.

While the cost of homes currently hover at all-time highs, rising tax and insurance costs might drive down prices, according to ICE. It might also cut into the market of consumers who want to refinance since they might not qualify for a new loan if their tax and insurance costs have risen too high. 
VOCATIONAL & TRADE SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIP

President's Day One unusual title for George Washington

He's known as the father of the country and hero of the America Revolution, but George Washington has another title that is less



known: Father of the Mule in America.

When he returned from the war, Washington found resources scarce and funds low. His crops had failed, too. But, he had a plan. He wanted to breed mules for American farming. A mule (the offspring of a male donkey and a female horse) could work longer on less food and water than a donkey or horse. The problem was Washington wanted a Spanish donkey to start his herd and that was difficult to come by since Spain limited export of its high quality donkeys. Finally the U.S. chargé d'affaires in Spain let Spain's Charles III know of his desire and two donkeys were dispatched in 1785. Only one donkey survived the trip and Washington named him Royal Gift (a name less sentimental name than that of his dog, Sweetlips) and set about creating his herd. Fifteen years later he had 60 mules.



Your heart has another focus of attention, too. In the last 45 years, your heart has been at the center of American Heart Month every February.


It's a good time to get serious about following up with your doctor about your lifestyle and general health. Both can give clues as to the condition of your heart.










Concussion: Myths and facts

Myth: Someone suffering a concussion should be awakened repeatedly.

Fact: Sleeping is the best thing for the injured person, so do not disturb. Getting physical and mental rest aids recovery.

Myth: Contact sports are the only ones that put athletes at risk of concussion.

Fact: Concussions can occur in any sport or recreational activity. If there is a violent movement or blow to the head or body that causes the brain to move rapidly inside the skull, it can cause a concussion, according to Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center.

Myth: A normal CT scan can rule out a concussion.

Fact: A CT scan detects structural injury and won't pick up a concussion, according to Ithaca College Department of Exercise and Sport Sciences.

Myth: You must lose consciousness or black out to have a concussion.

Fact: Only a small number of concussions involve loss of consciousness.

Myth: The harder someone is hit, the worse the concussion.

Fact: It doesn't always take a big hit to produce a concussion. Any contact to the head or body that causes rapid head movement can cause a concussion. For football players multiple lower impact hits in one game, or over time, might have more serious effects than a single high-impact collision, say experts reporting in Science News.

Drugs like Ozempic may offer heart health benefits

Medications like Ozempic and Wegovy may offer significant heart health benefits -- and not just through weight loss.

According to the British Heart Foundation, two studies presented at the 2024 European Congress on Obesity showed that semaglutide medications may help reduce the risk of heart attack, stroke, and other serious cardiac complications. The studies followed more than 17,000 overweight or obese adults who did not have diabetes, but received weekly semaglutide injections.

On average, the participants saw sustained weight loss of about 10 percent on average after four years, regardless of their age or body size. Participants were also less likely to experience lifethreatening heart events like heart attack or stroke, regardless of how much weight they lost. Even patients who did not lose weight at all de-



creased their risk, possibly due to the drug's effects on blood sugar, blood pressure, and inflammation of the heart.

But most U.S. insurers have restricted coverage of these drugs to patients with diabetes and pre-diabetes, and everyone else must shoulder the steep outof-pocket costs -- around \$1,000 per month or more, according to GoodRx. But Medicare and Medicaid may begin covering antiobesity drugs in 2025 if a new rule that would expand coverage takes effect. The rule, which the Biden administration proposed in November 2024, reclassifies obesity drugs as treatment for chronic disease.

of benefit from video games, even social interaction on some types of games, and a lot of satisfaction.

Researchers found this to be true in a 2013 study of 140 seniors who found themselves in better moods after playing video games. Seniors who used Nintendo Switch Sports (in which you actually use your body to play games on video) found they improved balance and coordination.





Transylvania Trip

Our travel today brings us to the amazing Salina Turda salt mine. This opened in 1992 as a tourist attraction, which provided a very entertaining site to visit on our wonderful trip of Transylvania.

The Turda salt mine was a vital part of the Transylvania economy. Something we don't think of today with all the modern mechanical conveniences of today, but in the middle-ages one of the few ways of preserving food was using salt in the process. So valuable was the salt, it was almost the equivalent to the gold. It was a national trading commodity. Turda salt mine was first mentioned in 1271 and continuing into the early 20th century. Also, the salt mine provided medicinal function due to the salt concentration. In 1992, the mine reopened as a halotherapy center providing holistic approach to medicine as a place to detox your body. During WWII, the salt mine served as shelter and was afterwards used a to store cheese.

Our purpose was a visit to the tourist attraction that was created. The mine is a vast cavern spanning 367 feet deep and 220 feet wide. The multi-level (13 stories deep) and lengthy various tunnels provided a very interesting attraction. Each floor is identified by the year that that level was opened. Some of the younger and more physically inclined people in our party traveled to the depths of this massive mining structure. The mine base can be reached by an extensive level of steps or by an elevator. Because of the massiveness of the structure, it provided entertaining areas called Echo Rooms. We wondered how they got the salt from the deepest parts to the surface. On one of the levels there was an octagon shaped room that housed a rudimentary machine. The machine was powered by horses or donkeys that were attached to the machine. As the horses/donkeys would walk around the machine a series of pulleys would raise 1-2 tons of salt to the service. Truly an extraordinary machinal feat. At the base of the salt is an underground lake that varies from about 1.5 to 26 feet deep. This provides part of the amusement area with boat rides.

The Turda salt mine today serves a massive tourist attraction. You can visit the various levels all the way to the base of the mine. The base of the mine has boat rides on the underground river, spa & wellness center and didactic swimming pool, that provides medicinal cleansing functions.

All-in-all it was a fun visit, even the trekking back up the literally hundreds of steps to get back to the surface and entrance to the Turda salt mine.

I hope you will continue to travel with us on the next interesting and exciting journey though Transylvania.


