PRESIDENT'S **MESSAGE**

For those ATS Members whose children and grandchildren are within our Saxon Summer Camp age brackets of 7 through 15, please see the ad in this issue for Camp Frederick. The Camp tells us that it's filling up fast, and we want as many of our members as possible to attend. Saxon Summer Camp will be held the week of June 15th.

It is almost the deadline for our College and Trade School bound members to complete their scholarship applications. The deadline to request an application has passed. Now they need to return all the required forms and information to the ATS Home Office before April 15th to be considered for a scholarship. The winners will be announced at the ATS Presidents Day meeting on May 17. Following that meeting, each applicant will be notified as to whether they were awarded a scholarship or not.

Did you know that Thomas Jefferson was first elected to the second Continental Congress on March 27, 1775? Jefferson, a delegate from Virginia, established himself in the Congress with the publication of his paper titled A Summary View of the Rights of British America. He published several more papers throughout the next year, according to History.com. In June 1776, Congress selected a committee to draft the Declaration of Independence. After much discussion, the committee selected Jefferson to compose this document. He completed the draft in only a few days. He was 33 years old at the time. The committee made a few minor changes in the draft, titled A Declaration by the Representatives in General Congress

Why do you get brain freeze?

Brain freeze, technically known as sphenopalatine ganglioneuralgia, happens when something cold hits the roof of your mouth fast—like chugging an icy drink or scarfing down ice cream.

The chill shocks the blood vessels in your palate, making them constrict quick, then dilate just as fast as your body tries to warm things back up. This rapid shift messes with nearby nerves, especially the trigeminal nerve, which handles face sensations. It freaks out and sends a pain signal to your brain, but since the nerve's wired to your forehead too, you feel it there—like a stab between the eyes.

Scientists think it's a leftover survival trick. Your brain might misread the sudden cold as a threat, like "whoa, something's freezing up here," even though it's just a Slurpee doing you dirty. The fix is simple: press your tongue to the roof of your mouth or sip something warm to calm the vessels down.

Assembled, and submitted it to Congress on June 28, 1776. Congress formally adopted the document on July 4, 1776, under the new title The Declaration of Independence.

Thomas Jefferson went on to draft other historical documents, including, in 1777, a bill establishing religious freedom that was formally enacted by Congress in 1786. The Library of Congress has approximately 25,000 items that he wrote. He served as the governor of Virginia from 1779 to 1781, the minister to France from 1784 to 1789, and was the first U.S. Secretary of State under President George Washington, from 1790 to 1793. He served as vice president to President John Adams from 1797 to 1801 and then was elected as the third president of the United States. He served two terms, from 1801 to 1809. During those years, he doubled the nation's geographic size with the peaceful Louisiana Purchase acquisition, supported the Lewis and Clark Expedition, and implemented the Embargo Act to defend the nation's industries from British threats to US shipping, limiting foreign trade and stimulating the birth of the American manufacturing industry. Following his presidency, Jefferson retired to his home in Virginia, named Monticello, having served the public for 34 years.

He founded the University of Virginia in 1819, envisioning a university free of church influences where students could specialize in new areas not offered at other colleges. He believed that education engendered a stable society, which should provide publicly funded schools accessible based solely on ability, according to Wikipedia. Jefferson organized the state legislative campaign for its charter, purchased the location, was the principal designer of the buildings, planned the curriculum, and served as the first rector upon the school's opening in 1825. At the age of 83, he passed away. He wrote his own epitaph: Here was buried Thomas Jefferson, author of the Declaration of American Independence, of the Statute of Virginia for Religious Freedom, and Father of the University of Virginia. The date of his death was July 4, 1826. This was 50 years to the day after signing the Declaration of Independence.

It's a traffic fact: More pedestrians are being hit by cars

• They are listening to music.

Hearing is as important as seeing. Listening to music makes it impossible to hear an oncoming vehicle. Researchers at the University of Washington and Seattle Children's Hospital say music listeners crossed intersections faster than others with electronic devices, but they didn't watch for cars and couldn't hear them.

• They are texting.

Walkers who are texting may be at most risk. This finding is in line with several studies. Texters also walked slower than everyone else, including those talking on cellphones. Texters were four times less likely to follow safety rules, including looking both ways, staying on the crosswalk, and obeying traffic signals.

• They are talking on the phone.

Pedestrians who were talking on cellphones, browsing the Internet, or even talking to someone next to them all had an increased risk of injury.

Most of the distracted walkers were adults, but it's important for parents to tell their children to put down their phones when walking.

Get ready to enjoy JAM! April is ... National Jazz Appreciation Month

Jazz it up in April to celebrate National Jazz Appreciation Month.

Jazz is an historical, cultural and living American treasure.

That's why the Smithsonian Institution launched National Jazz Appreciation Month in 2001 to pay tribute to jazz as a living art form. It has grown to include celebrations in all 50 states and in 40 countries.

The Smithsonian houses a huge jazz collection that includes Duke Ellington's unpublished music, Ella Fitzgerald's red dress, Dizzy Gillespie's angled trumpet, and Benny Goodman's clarinet.

Jazz comes in many forms: ragtime, bebop, the blues, soul, Dixieland, bigband, fusion, Latin, funk, and the list goes on. JAM, as the month-long tribute is called, encourages every musician, concert hall, school band and orchestra to offer special programs.

Louis Armstrong is considered the founding father of Jazz, and the most well known and loved ensembles include:

Best quintets: Miles Davis Quintet and Louis Armstrong's Hot Five.

Best sextets: Miles Davis Sextet and the Benny Goodman Sextet.

Best big bands: Benny Goodman, Count Basie, Dizzy Gillespie, Stan Kenton and Billy Eckstine

Duke Ellington is considered one of the most important big-band leaders and he became hugely popular. He was responsible for making jazz an art form similar to classical music. Ellington received 13 Grammy awards, a Pulitzer Prize, a Presidential Medal of Freedom, and Commemorative U.S. quarter.

This month, how about streaming all the old tunes by Frank Sinatra, Tony Bennett, Ella Fitzgerald, Lena Horne or Nancy Wilson.

Steep yourself in the swing rhythm, polyrhythm, improvisation and syncopation that represent the almost exclusive characteristics of jazz music.



A study published in the journal Health Affairs found that nearly 30 percent of U.S. pharmacies closed between 2010 and 2021, leaving many communities in so-called pharmacy deserts. According to the New York Times, reduced access to pharmacies poses a particular threat to older adults, the vast majority of whom take at least one prescription drug each year. Pharmacies also dispense 80 percent of shingles vaccines and as much as 70 percent of flu shots, and provide other essential basic health services that many seniors rely on.

How to improve your garden soil

Compaction, poor drainage, heavy clay content, and other natural or manmade variations can all lead to less-than-ideal conditions for growing beautiful flowers and perfect tomatoes. But a little elbow grease (and a few bags of aged manure) can yield short and long-term benefits that your plants -- from this year and years to come -- will appreciate.

When air pockets in the soil collapse, the result is compaction -- rock hard soil that starves plant roots of water and oxygen. Compaction has a variety of causes, including foot traffic, heavy machinery, overworking soil or working soil that is too wet or too dry, and high clay content. Minerals like gypsum work well to aerate clay soils, and the addition of organic material like compost helps create new air pockets in the soil. And while you might not be able to get through the soil, e arthworms

can, digging burrows and leaving nutrient-rich droppings wherever they go.

Most plants can't thrive without adequate soil drainage, which keeps the soil oxygenated and also works to prevent compaction. Organic matter such as compost, peat moss, or processed rice husks can help, along with other amendments like sand and perlite. You can also build



up a slope to encourage water to flow away from the flower bed.

Clay soil is an uphill battle for many gardeners, and the solution -- as with so many other garden problems -- is more organic matter, such as compost, well-rotted (not fresh) manure, and leaf mold. Gypsum can also help break up clay soil, but use with caution -- it can alter soil pH and deplete nutrients.

Easter Bread: A lovely traditional touch on the holiday

Tasty spiced and sweet bread is a staple of ancient Easter celebrations in many cultures.

In Slavic cultures, like Poland, Russia, and Ukraine, Paska is a sweet, treat made especially for Easter. A similar Greek tradition features Tsoureki, a light, spiced bread, usually braided into a loaf. Both feature hardboiled eggs, dyed red, and tucked into dough before baking. The eggs are actually in the shell and, while they can be eaten, they usually are not.

Here is a recipe that is a hybrid of Paska and Tsoureki:

For the Dough:

4 cups all-purpose flour (plus extra for dusting)

2 1/4 tsp (1 packet, 7g) active dry yeast

3/4 cup whole milk, warmed to about 110F

Half cup granulated sugar 3 large eggs (2 for dough, 1 for egg wash)

1 cup unsalted butter, melted and cooled slightly

1 tsp vanilla extract Zest of 1 orange (Tsoureki-inspired twist)

1/2 tsp salt

Optional: 1 tsp ground mahleb (a Greek spice from cherry pits) or 1/2 tsp ground cardamom (for a

For Decoration:

3-4 hard-boiled eggs, dyed red (traditional, optional)

1 tbsp milk (for egg wash) Optional: sesame seeds or slivered almonds for sprinkling.

Instructions

Activate the Yeast:

In a small bowl, combine warm milk, 1 tbsp of the sugar, and yeast. Stir gently and let it sit for 5-10 minutes until foamy. If it doesn't foam, your yeast might be dead—start over.

Mix the Dough:

In a large bowl (or stand mixer with dough hook), whisk together flour, remaining sugar, salt, and orange zest (plus mahleb or cardamom if using). Make a well in the center, then add the yeast mixture, 2 eggs, melted butter, and vanilla. Stir until it forms a shaggy dough.

Knead:

Knead by hand on a floured surface for 8-10 min-

utes, or in a mixer for 5-7 minutes, until smooth and elastic. The dough should be soft but not sticky—add a little flour if needed.

First Rise:

Place the dough in a greased bowl, cover with a clean towel or plastic wrap, and let it rise in a warm spot (75-80F) for 1-1.5 hours, until doubled.

Shape the Bread:

Punch down the dough and divide into 3 equal pieces. Roll each piece into a 16-inch (40cm) rope. Braid them together, then either form a round loaf (tucking ends under) or leave as a long braid. If using dyed eggs, gently press them into the dough at intervals (they'll bake in place).

Second Rise:

Transfer to a parchmentlined baking sheet, cover, and let rise for 45 minutes until puffy.

Bake:

Preheat oven to 350F. Beat the remaining egg with 1 tbsp milk and brush over the dough for a shiny finish. Sprinkle with sesame seeds or almonds if desired. Bake for 30-40 minutes, until golden brown and hollow-sounding when tapped (internal temp of 190F if you've got a thermometer). If the top browns too fast, tent with foil.

Cool & Serve:

Let it cool on a rack for at least 20 minutes. Serve warm or at room temp—great plain or with butter.

Yield: 1 large loaf, serves 8-12.

Notes

The dyed eggs are edible but might overcook slightly in the oven. For looks only, swap them out post-baking.

Store leftovers wrapped at room temp for up to 3 days or freeze for a month.



 - Jaw pain. Teeth-grinding to rid





TRANSYLVANIA TRIP

On today's Transylvania trip we visited the picturesque town of Timisoara, Romania, with a rich diverse history, dating back to before Christ.

Timisoara, the largest city in western Romania, grew around the site of Castrum Regium Themes, an ancient Roman crossroad fortress. Although surrounded by marshlands, in 1241, Timisoara was invaded and partially destroyed by the Tartars. In 1552, the Turkish armies conquered Timisoara and kept the town under their authority until 1716 when the region of Banat came under Austrian rule. Soon after the Habsburg Empire took over the Banat region, from the Ottomans, the new governor of Banat, General Mercy, commissioned a heptagramshaped bastion with strong walls, towers and gates.

During early 1720's large numbers of Swabian immigrants settled in Timisoara. The Swabians - skilled craftsmen from Swabia, southern Germany - helped transform Timisoara in a major commercial and manufacturing town. Austrians, Germans, Jews, Serbians and Hungarians all left their mark during the two centuries of Austrian domination of Timisoara.

There is a statue in the central square which represented the settling of the area of three waves of creating a permanent settlement. Timisoara was a vast swampland. The first wave of settlers were stricken with malaria and the entire community died. The second wave figured out how to harness the swampy, useful land on which structures could be built, and conquered the problem of the malaria infested swampland.

The final wave of people were the people that benefited from all the efforts

of the first and second wave of settlers, and built a thriving, vibrant city.

One of the churches demonstrates the ingenuity of conquering the swampland. Most of the churches of Transylvania and Romania had towering steeples as a focal point of the structure. Because much of Timisoara was built on swampland it was feared that to build a similar structure, with its tremendous weight, would sink into the previous swampland base. In order to avoid this, the church did not have a massive steeple structure. In addition, to insure that the structure would not become a casualty of the previous swampland, 10,000 oak trees were cut and used as the foundation for the church base. This is a true example of man adapting to the environment and applying ingenuity to solve a problem.

Austrians, Germans, Jews, Serbians and Hungarians all left their mark during the two centuries of Austrian domination of Timisoara. Their mark can be seen in the structure, streets and way of life they brought to Timisoara.

Another historical site is the Romanian National Opera building. It became the focal point of the Romanian Revolution against Communist rule of Romania. In December 17,1989 a popular uprising began in Timisoara against the Communist regime of Nicolae Ceausescu. The Hungarian Calvinist pastor Lazlo Tokes was ordered to be deported by the Securitate, or secret police, and as a reaction, his house was surrounded by members of his church. People supporting him, including people of Romanian origin, gathered at the central square (Opera Square). The Communist administration ordered the army to fire at the congregation. However, a number of army officers refused to open fire and sided with the people. That was the beginning of the Romanian Revolution of 1989, which ended the Communist regime a week later. Timisoara was declared the first Free Town on December 20,1989, suffering 130 reported deaths and 3,352 wounded during the revolution.

This ends our historical journey of Timisoara. We will

pick up the story next time when we celebrate in Timisoara and see how Timisoara is affected by current events happening in the world.
